ANOTHER NEW BRICK AT THE UNIVERSITY

L. N. Roney Will Erect One on West Eighth Street.

President Strong Spoke of His Relations With the School.

ONE STORY HIGH.

L. N. Roney, the well known builder and contractor, is clearing the ground on his lot just west of his two story brick block on West Eighth street for the erection of another brick to be 37x80 feet and one story high. A part of the brick for the erection of the building is already on the ground.

When asked by a GUARD reporter this morning concerning the new structure, Mr. Roney stated that it has been leased to a well known company for a term of years, but that he does not like to give out the name of the company until the leases are all signed up and everything arranged satisfactorily.

NO SUMMER SCHOOL.

At assembly this morning Dr Strong addressed the faculty and students briefly concerning the University and his relations with it. He gave a short account of his college days at Yale, preparation and practice of law, and how he became connected with educational work. Dr Strong said that there were many reasons why he decided to leave but none derogatory to the University of Oregon. Among the reasons he gave were that Kansas is where he began active life, that Kansas is a strenuous state and that the people of Kansas comprehend and support the idea of a modern state university. Concerning the University of Oregon, he said he always had and always would have great affection for the institution. Oregon has not the idea of a state university, and she will not have a true university until she gets this idea.

NEW IDEA IN ENTERTAINING.

The young ladies of the University are never in want for a new idea how to entertain their patrons and at the same time succeed financially. Of course the profits are never commensurate with the time and labor put forth by the girls. The latest idea is a "Trip around the World," the proceeds of which will be given to the baseball team. The project for the journey is two imaginary ports called San Francisco and Portland on the corners of Ninth and Willamette and Eleventh and Mill respectively. Places visited will be Japan at Prof Howe's residence; Spain at Mrs Johnson's; Germany at Mrs Luckey's; Scotland at Mrs Waid's; Washington, D C, at the gymnasium. The journey will be made in carry-alls and buses visiting the different ports every 15 minutes; so the crowd will be kept moving. At each of the stopping places refreshments will be served according to the country represented. A dance will be given afterward at the gymnasium. The proceeds warrant a good time.

NO SUMMER SCHOOL.

The board of regents of the University has decided not to give a summer school this year, although preliminary announcements have been made. The first summer school was instituted last year by Dr Strong, and it was only by considerable sacrifice on his part that the session was a success.
