SHERIFF CANDIDATE'S VOTE COMPARISON.

The nomination of candidates for the sheriff's office who have each been voted for and elected twice makes comparisons of former election returns interesting and instructive.

HOW A J JOHNSON RAN.

In 1894 there were three tickets in the field, with three candidates for each office from the top to the bottom of the ticket therefore it is impossible to make intelligent comparisons. However J H McClung received 2088 votes for senator, and O H Baker, of Waterville 1976 votes for representative, while A J Johnson, the Republican candidate for sheriff, received but 1957.

In 1896 it was a straight race between Mr Johnson for reelection, and Horace Hampton, Democratic candidate. With the advantage of having held the office two years Mr Johnson was elected by only 58 majority. And Mr Hampton practically made no contest for the place believing, as he regretfully stated after the returns came in showing such a close vote, that he had no show. At that same election the candidates for prosecuting attorney were both entire strangers to the citizens of Lane county, even as to their reputations. The Republican candidate carried the county by 265 votes. So much for Mr Johnson's record as a political racer.

HOW W W WITHERS RAN.

In 1894 it was a three-handed race, A J Johnson Republican, Henry J Day Democrat, and W W Withers Peoples, being the candidates. Mr Day's popularity drew heavily from Mr Withers and he was a bad third in the race.

In 1896 it was a straight fight between C L Scott, Republican, and W W Withers, Democrat. Though Mr Scott had the advantage of having served as chief deputy under Mr Johnson, Withers was

electd though by the close majority of 25 votes.

In 1900 it was again a two-handed contest, Sheriff Withers being reelected by the splendid majority of 794 votes. At this same election the Republican candidate for supreme judge had 410 majority over his Democratic opponent. And both candidates were practically unknown in this county.

COMPARATIVE POPULARITY.

Running for a second term Mr Johnson barely pulled through, with but 58 majority, through the county was quite heavily Republican, as shown by the vote for prosecuting attorney.

Running for a second term Sheriff Withers carried the county by 794 majority. And that with majorities of over four hundred for the Republican candidates for congress and supreme judge!

We may often judge the future from the past. Who will say that the figures we have given do not indicate with almost absolute certainty who will be elected sheriff next Monday?

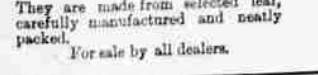
