TO PROTECT U. S. MAILS.

A Fine of \$1000 for Breaking Open Rural Mail Boxes.

Postmaster H F McCornack has been advised by A W Machen, general superintendent of the rural free delivery mail system, relating to the protection from depredations of rural free delivery mail boxes. To willfully break open any of these boxes, to maliciously injure, deface, or destroy any mail or willingly aid or assist in the offense shall upon conviction be fined to the amount of \$1000 or by imprisonment not more than three years.

The postoffice officials are requested to report all depredations of this character to the United States attorney for the district in which the offense was committed and prosecution will follow.

MORE RESIGNATIONS.

Reported That Two More U O Professors Will Quit.

For two or three days past the GUARD has heard a report to the effect that Dr. Thomas Condon, the eminent geologist, and Prof. Geo Lilley, professor of mathematics at the University of Oregon, had resigned.

To ascertain whether or not this report is true, a GUARD reporter today called upon Hon. S. H. Friendly, a member of the board of regents of the University, and asked him concerning the report. Mr. Friendly said: "I can neither confirm or deny it."

From Mr. Friendly's statement the inference is drawn that the two named gentlemen have resigned or soon will.

Further inquiry from another source, however, brought the information that Dr. Condon, who has been with the University many years, will probably be given the position of professor emeritus on a salary, and that Prof. Lilley has not resigned, and emphatically states that he will not do so.

WILL TEAR DOWN.

LOCAL STAGE LINES.

Blue River Will Get a Daily Stage After July 1st.

Ell Banks informed a GUARD reporter today that commencing July 1st he will run a daily stage line from Eugene to Blue River, forty-two miles east of Eugene. Besides Mr Banks believes that the postoffice department will authorize the extension of the daily mail service to Blue River. It now terminates at Leaburg, 26 miles from Eugene, where it changes to a tri-weekly route to Foley springs.

The rapidly growing importance of the Blue River mining section certainly demands better facilities, besides the sixteen added miles of the route would place the end of the daily route at the point where most of the business above Waverly originates. The importance of the Blue River mining trade becomes apparent when one considers that there is no local business to speak of between Leaburg and Blue River. The added expense of the daily stage must be met by business from the mining district.

Mr Banks has two locally-built three seated stages just ready to come out of the shop for use on the Blue River line.

It is a hard road on wagons, and Mr Banks has them built at home. The factory stages go to pieces too quick on rough roads with the heavy loads that must be carried.

OTHER STAGE LINES.

Mr Banks has sublet the route from Goshen to Zion, Low Valley precinct, to Mr Parker of Pleasant Hill. The subcontractor will restock the line and give a first-class service.

The route from Springfield to Lowell on the north side of the river will be run by Lester & Potter. The subcontractors on this route will make their headquarters at the Geo Gross barn by the Minnesota House. These changes will take effect July 1st.

J B CHAMBERS' WILL.

Leaves His Property to His Wife and Three Sons.

The will of the late J B Chambers was filed for probate this afternoon. Its provisions are as follows:

After all debts and funeral charges are paid, his wife, Martha J Chambers, shall have the use and income of all personal property.

When his wife shall have deceased his sons, Frank L, Chas N and Fred E, share equally in all personal and real property, including the sums of money already given them.

Martha J Chambers is appointed executrix without bonds.

The will was executed Sept 30, 1897, in the presence of Geo W Nole and H D Wylie.

A codicil executed Feb 26, 1902, provides that Martha J Chambers, his wife, may, if she desires, sell any or all the real estate.
