OREGON POSTOFFICES.

Fourteen to Pay Increased Salaries on July 1—Four Will Have Their Salaries Cut

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The following changes in the salaries of presidential postmasters in Oregon, in effect July 1, have been announced at the department:

Increases—Astoria, \$2300 to \$2400; Dallas, \$1400 to \$1500; Grants Pass, \$1700 to \$1800; Lebanon, \$1000 to \$1100; Oregon City, \$1800 to \$1900; Silverton, \$1000 to \$1100; Tillamook, \$1100 to \$1200; Albany, \$2100 to \$2200; Ashland, \$1700 to \$1800; Cottage Grove, \$1200 to \$1300; Forest Grove, \$1300 to \$1400; Hillsboro, \$1100 to \$1200; McMinnville, \$1600 to \$1700; Prineville, \$1100 to \$1200.

Decreases—Arlington, \$1300 to \$1200; Huntington, \$1100 to \$1000; Independence, \$1200 to \$1100; Sumpter, \$1700 to \$1600.

Eugene remains stationary, no increase or decrease from the present salary of \$2300 a year—ED GUARD.

All that was mortal of the late ex-Governor Sylvester Penneyer was laid at rest with touching ceremonies Sunday afternoon. Before the funeral services many friends and acquaintances of the deceased visited the Penneyer home and took a last look at the remains, which lay in state in the front parlor. The services were held at St Stephen's church, the Rev T N Willson officiating. The chapel was filled to overflowing. Favorite selections of the governor were sung by the choir, including, "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Lead Kindly Light."

The active bearers were: George E Chamberlain, W A Munly, O H Page, Alfred Holman, and T Scott Brooke. The honorary bearers were Governor T T Geer, ex-Governor Z F Moody, Judge Geo H Williams, Col John McCracken, W K Smith, A T Smith, George T Meyers and Phil Melchian.

The body was interred in the family lot at Lone Fir cemetery.

The Boer War.

Now that peace has been declared in South Africa it may be interesting to note a few facts concerning the war. Here are a few figures, etc.:

Began October, 1899.
Total available fighting force of Boers (estimated), 50,000.

Total number of British troops engaged from first to last, 500,000.

Largest number of British troops in field at one time, 230,000.

British losses (official statistics to April 1, 1902):

Total deaths—Officers, 1,020; men, 20,031. Missing and prisoners—Officers 384; men, 9,181.

Boer losses—Prisoners, 37,000; killed and wounded, no statistics available.

Cost of war to Great Britain to date, about \$1,350,000,000.

Cost of war to Boers—No statistics available.

Commander-in-chief of British forces in South Africa—Buller, Roberts, and Kitchener.

Principal Boer commanders—Joubert, Botha, DeWet and Delarey.
