BOER-BRITISH PEACE.

Great Britain has compelled peace in South Africa after an expenditure of a billion and half a dollars and a loss of thirty thousand lives. Probably Boer losses, including lives of women and children sacrificed incident to the struggle, equal those of the British. A fearful loss of life and treasure in the aggregate.

Great Britain shows a high order of statesmanship by giving the vanquished Boers most liberal terms. Their enemies of the past two years cannot but become their friends. Here is a synopsis of the peace argument:

The burgher forces lay down their arms and hand over all their rifles, guns and munitions of war in their possession or under their control. All prisoners are to be brought back as soon as possible to South Africa, without loss of liberty or property. No action to be taken against prisoners except where they are guilty of breaches of the rules of war. Dutch is to be taught in the schools, it desired by the parents, and used in the courts if necessary. Rifles are allowed for protection. Military occupation is to be withdrawn as soon as possible, and self-government substituted. There is to be no tax on the Transvaal to pay the cost of the war. The sum of 3,000,000 pounds sterling, \$15,000,000, is to be provided for restoring the Boer farms. Rebels are liable for trial, according to the law of the colony to which they belong. The rank and file will be disfranchised for life. Loans will be made on a year's time without interest, afterward to draw three per cent.

NO PORTLAND FLOOD THIS YEAR.

Portland is not liable to have a summer flood this season through Columbia river backwater caused by melting snows on its headwaters, many hundred miles in the interior. The Wednesday Telegram says:

A year ago yesterday the river reached its highest mark for 1901. The gauge in Portland registered 20.8 feet, the exact stage reported today. Mr. Beale says there is now little danger of a flood. At Portland and The Dalles the river will slowly fall for several days, unless an extreme hot spell sets in.

MCKENZIE WAGON-ROAD.

While raising money for the McKenzie wagon-road between Walterville and the Blue River mines that section of road across the mountains should not be overlooked. With twenty-five miles of mountain road for the McKenzie Bridge project supervisor to work there are but four persons subject to poll road tax, while the taxable property amounts to but little.

A large amount of trade and traffic comes across this road to Eugene. It should be put in shape for the summer and fall travel as the earliest possible moment.

GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT.

Present Condition of Grain and Fruit in Oregon.

The condition of grain continues good, especially in the eastern portion of the state. There has been plenty of moisture for spring sown wheat and as the plant has started nicely the yield promise to be larger than usual. Fall wheat is heading, but owing to the cool weather, it is making slow advancement, and steady, mild temperature is now needed to mature a plump and hard kernel.

Some alfalfa has been cut in Southern Oregon, and clover and alfalfa is generally ready for harvesting, which is retarded by the unsettled condition of the weather. Pastures continue good and stock is now fat and sleek. Sheep shearing is progressing slowly and the clip will probably be an average one.

Sugar beets in Union county are being thinned and the crop is doing nicely. Gardens, corn, potatoes and hops all need warmer weather, but they continue thrifty and promising although very backward.

The warm weather during the first of the week brought in a number of encouraging fruit reports to the effect that the damage to prunes, cherries and pears was not as great as expected, but the weather later became unfavorable, and the damage in the Willamette valley to Italian prunes, Royal Ann cherries and Bartlett pears is considerable. In Southern and Eastern Oregon the fruit outlook is very promising, and there will undoubtedly be plenty of berries in all parts of the state. Early apples have dropped badly, but winter apples, as far as can be determined, have set nicely.
