DID THE PHILIPPINES GO WITH FURNISH?

What does the Oregonian think about the Philippines now that Mr. Furnish is defeated? Before the election it was "no Furnish, no Philippines" with the Portland paper. Roosevelt was to be dethroned in the defeat of the Pen-dleton fee-grabber, and all manner of evils were conjured in case of defeat to hold the party to its knitting.

President Roosevelt has probably heard of the election, and if he compares the figures with previous elections cannot but conclude that the people of Oregon had good reasons for leaving Furnish at home—that they knew their business.

VOLCANIC KINSHIP.

Pelee and La Souffriere had company in their efforts to relieve this globe of inner disturbances. Word just comes from the far North that five and thirty-three days respectively prior to the great death-dealing disturbance of Mount Pelee, two of far-away Alaska's loftiest peaks were in active eruption.

On April 11th Mount Blackburn, which is the fountain-head apparently of the famed Muir glacier in Southeastern Alaska, belched forth a volume of dense black smoke, followed twenty-two days later—May 3d—by a similar volcanic disturbance of Mount Redoubt, a towering peak on the north and west coast of Cook's Inlet.

SOME FIGURES ON THE GOVERNOR VOTE.

How was Chamberlain elected? Whoever took Furnish out on the canvass was responsible for the result. He would have been easily elected had he staid at home.

Let us do some figuring! In 1900 McKinley had 13,141 plurality over Bryan in a total vote of 79,911. McKinley got 46,526, and Bryan 33,885. Now the vote is practically divided evenly between Chamberlain and Furnish. Considering the presidential vote a party one, and allowing Furnish a thousand Democratic votes, Chamberlain was voted for by 7,570 Republicans, about one out of every six who voted for McKinley.

Of course factional differences were largely responsible for the vote in Marion and Umatilla counties while Chamberlain was popular at home—Portland. But those counties alone would not have elected Chamberlain. Furnish showed himself. That was enough. He was defeated.

If you do not think about Eugene being a pretty good stage town be around the hotels when the stages leave at six o'clock of week-day mornings. There is considerable passenger travel on the Florence route and up the McKenzie and Willamette rivers, also to Coburg.

The farther away Furnish got from home the better he ran—an unusual experience in politics. In Union county adjoining Umatilla, the latter his home county, Furnish failed to carry a single precinct. He lost Umatilla by 597.

A Walla Walla dispatch says fifteen miles of barbed-wire telephone lines, with a number of talking machines connected, is a new enterprise in that section whereby farmers are given the benefits of city life with none of its

expense. The line connects the residences of five substantial farmers with the Walla Walla central exchange. The line cost only \$300.

HEIRED AFTER A ROOSTER.

A peculiar story comes from Portugal. A wealthy woman named Siliva, died recently at Lisbon, and left her entire property to a rooster. She was a fervid spiritualist, a believer in the transmigration of the soul and imagined that the soul of her dead husband had entered the rooster.

She caused a special fowl house to be built and ordered her servants to pay extra attention to their master's wants.

The disgust of her relatives over the will caused the story to become public, and a lawsuit might have followed had not one of the heirs adopted the simple expedient of having the wealthy rooster killed, and thus becoming himself the next of kin.
