AN UNJUST INSINUATION.

Cottage Grove Leader: Eugene gave a majority of over 300 against J P Curran for Commissioner. Where is the man that can't read between the lines on this matter? The Leader is usually fair in its statements, and we cannot but believe that it has been misinformed as to how Eugene voted on county commissioner. The returns show that Mr Curran got his party vote in Eugene though running against a candidate who lives in the central part of the county but a few miles from Eugene. We give the figures on two state offices, the candidates for which, on both tickets, were practically strangers to the Eugene, voting population:

For state treasurer Henry Blackman of Morrow county and Charles S Moore of Klamath county were the candidates. Mr Moore, the Republican, received 307 plurality in the Eugene precincts.

For secretary of state Frank I Dunbar of Clatsop county and D W Sears of Polk county were the candidates. Mr Dunbar, Republican and present incumbent, received 295 plurality.

For county commissioner, the vote about which the Leader unjustly complains, H D Edwards, Republican, a resident of Springfield precinct, his home being but seven miles from Eugene, received 302 plurality. The figures show for themselves the injustice of the Leader insinuation. Edwards got no more than his party vote in Eugene.

Book Plates.

The question of the use of the family coat of arms vexes the American very seriously. Originally all book plates were heraldic. That was in an age when people generally could not read and when the blazon of each family, as shown on wearing apparel or small belongings, was as well known and quickly distinguished as an autograph or photograph today. In the main, it is safe to advise Americans not to use coat armor on their book plates. The uncertainty of the actual right to arms and the extreme difficulty of getting a drawing that one knows is undeniably correct in every detail are strong reasons against its use. Heraldry is too exact a science to admit of liberties, and it is no small achievement to draw the coat of arms with absolute correctness and yet with artistic feeling.

Though it is not very generally practiced, it is legal to copyright the book plate design. At least two plates are so protected in this country. This would seem to leave a door open for those who wish to secure for themselves a personal distinguishing mark, a quasi-heraldry, for the drawing may be in heraldic form as well as in any other.

First Railroad Charter.

That was before the days of steam, and the "wagons" that were to be used on the road were to be moved by horse power. That old charter and the rights it conveyed were purchased by the original Delaware and Lackawanna company for \$1,000.
