## THE PENITENTIARY ESCAPE.

The harvest of death that convicts Tracey and Merrill left behind them in their sensational escape from the Oregon state penitentiary Monday morning, and the ease with which the guards missed the men as they got a ladder and scaled the prison-yard wall in plain view and easy rifle shot, are suggestive. The guards can't shoot, else were too nervous to shoot at that kind of game. We suggest in case of the capture of the thugs that they be given guard duty. Three dead men under such exciting circumstances is sufficient evidence as to their ability to handle the rifle.

Armed as they are, and desperate as men may be from the knowledge that their lives are certain forfeit in case of capture, there is sure to be more loss of life if their pursuers crowd them too close. Hunting such men is not a pleasant job. Their lack of knowledge of the country will militate against their finally getting completely away, still the season of year is greatly in their favor. They can cross the country in any direction, the weather permits their remaining or sleeping in any place of hiding, while they may procure food from gardens at night without risk of being observed or located. Of course they had their plans laid as to the course they would pursue when once outside. And men as cool as they proved themselves to be during the trying moments of escape are not liable to lose their heads now that they are free men. They may be caught and made to expiate their terrible crime on the gallows, but it seems to us the chances are against such a desired consummation of justice. Incidentally it may be remarked that they are good men to leave alone unless the pursuer can catch them napping or off their guard. Ordinarily men would be greatly excited under such circumstances, but they shot as if shooting at a target. And they got their man every time.

## KILLED SLEEP FOR THE OTHER MAN.

"A fellow out in my country," said Representative Cushman, the State of Washington humorist, "owed another fellow \$10. It was due on Tuesday. At midnight on Monday night the man who owed the money came around, woke his friend up and told him he couldn't pay the ten."

"It worried me so I couldn't sleep, and I just thought I'd tell you now," he said.

"Dern it," said the other man, "why didn't you wait till morning? Now I can't sleep either."

Looked at from a financial standpoint there is nothing but loss resultant from the Boer war. On the one side the republics are wiped out of existence, and on the other the cost of bringing this result about has been far in excess of any resulting benefits that even the ages can repay. The ending of the Boer war brings to mind the words of the greatest British general, who, after Waterloo, wrote his government: "Nothing except a battle lost can be half so melancholy as a battle won."

The Register should welcome reminders of the fact. They may be saved making similar mistakes in the future.

## GOVERNOR GEER'S CANDIDACY

For United States Senator Endorsed by Popular Vote.

PORTLAND, June 9.—Gov. Geer has announced his candidacy for the U. S. senate, and in an interview with the Journal said:

"As to the senate, I will only say that the flattering large vote given me by the people will give me the office without question, unless the legislature sees proper to ignore the popular will which is not at all likely. While I have apparently carried every county, Wood only polled his party vote, and my majority is far in excess of the newly-elected members. And since no man voted for me who favored any other man for the United States Senate, it is difficult to suppose that such members will have a disposition to disregard the instructions of the people on the senate. A presidential elector would have the same right to ignore the popular vote as would a member of the legislature under these circumstances."
