A LOCOMOTIVE BOUGHT.

Bohemia Railroad Secures One from Corvallis & Eastern.

Today's Oregonian: About six miles of grade are completed on the Bohemia railroad and rails are being laid to permit the passage of construction trains.

The only rolling stock now owned by the company, the Oregon & Southeastern, is a locomotive purchased from the Corvallis & Eastern a few days ago and delivered at Cottage Grove yesterday. Other rolling stock needed in construction work will be hired from the Southern Pacific.
A switch has been put in at Cottage Grove, giving connection between the Oregon & Southeastern and the Southern Pacific main line.
About 300 tons of 56-pound rails are on the ground ready for laying. These are second-hand rails and are said to have been obtained from the Union Pacific.

A SMALLPOX SCARE.

John Kissinger, Postmaster at Fall Creek, May Have the Disease.

R C Edwards, of Fall Creek, came down today and reports the Fall Creek neighbor d very badly excited over the suspicion that John Kissinger, postmaster at Fall Creek, twelve miles from Eugene, has the smallpox. The only opportunity Mr Kissinger had to catch the disease was shortly before the first of June when he went to Roseburg on land business. He was too ill to go to the polls and vote on election day, June 2nd. As Mr Kissinger keeps the postoffice not a few of the residents came in contact with him about the time the disease was "catching," hence are somewhat uneasy as to the outcome. Dr Atwood went up this morning to attend Mr Kissinger.

LATER.

Dr Atwood returned shortly after noon and diagnoses the case as "Manila itch." There is a difference of opinion, however, among the medical profession as to the nature of the disease, not a few reputable physicians asserting that the so-called "Manila itch" is a very light form of smallpox. In any event Mr Kissinger's neighbors will not trouble him with their presence until he is safely over the sickness.

ALMA ETHERTON.

Died From Pleuro-Pneumonia Last Evening.

Alma L Etherton, the popular mixologist at Wellington Wadole's Oregon saloon, died at his home at 515 Ferry street last evening, after an illness of only two weeks from pleuro-pneumonia.

The news of his untimely death came as a great shock to his friends, many of whom did not even know that he was ill.

The deceased young man was aged 26 years, and leaves a wife and infant child. Mrs Etherton, who is prostrate over her great bereavement has the sincere sympathy of all.

From his jovial and kind-hearted disposition the deceased won many warm friends during his year's residence in Eugene.

The remains were taken to Muddy, Linn county, this afternoon for burial.
