A MARTIAL AGE.

Talk about the martial spirit of this age of trusts and educational development not being comparable to the rough and ready past! Read this Oregon City account of the departure of a company of fifty or sixty brave militiamen in quest of two bold, bad penitentiary men and weep with the maidens if you have tears to spare:

The departure of Company A Third Regiment, O N G last night for Molalla Corners was the cause of almost as great a demonstration as when the Oregon National Guards took their departure for the Philippines. Green and red fire was burned, and rockets whizzed through the air, while the soldier secured their ration at grocery stores. The soldiers went to Molalla by private conveyance. During the week one young man made some derogatory remarks about soldiers, and but for the intervention of bystanders would have received more than a black eye. As the militia mounted the wagons there were a number of affectionate farewells, and several young women were observed to be in tears.

It is needless to remark that all the glory of the soldier does not consist in being fed on salt meat and hardtack, sleeping on the ground and being shot by the enemy.

IT IS COLD ABOVE US.

Scientists tell us of the infinite cold of space. One of a number of toy balloons conveying self-registering apparatus sent up by the International Aeronautic Commission of Berlin, reached a height of over twelve miles. The pressure of the gas in the balloons overcoming the weight of the thin outside air, burst the balloons and the self-registering apparatus fell safely to the ground by means of the tiny parachute to which the thermometer was attached.

How cold was it twelve miles above us? Our Webster people complain dreadfully when the mercury falls to zero, thirty-two degrees below freezing. That messenger of the skies came to earth with a record of having been in space where it was eighty degrees below zero, about the limit of earthly coldness.

A DEEP-WATER CRAB.

A Brooklyn museum has a great curiosity in a newly acquired Japanese crab. It spreads 11 1/2 feet. Its home is in the ocean, off the Japan coast, in a depth from 600 to 4,200 feet. The Japs do a great deal of deep sea fishing yet not more than a dozen of these crabs are usually taken in a year.

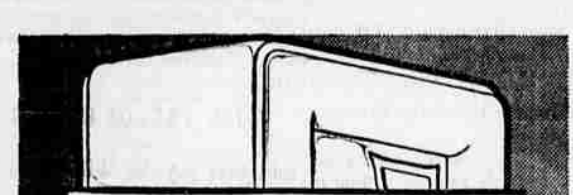
