Large and Commodious Building to Be Erected by the S. P. Company.

## DROWNED.

L. H. Gigot Loses His Life Near Wendling.

Another drowning accident occurred in Mill creek above Wendling Saturday evening. L. H. Gigot, who was employed by the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., in one of their logging camps on the creek, while crossing on a footlog just after quitting time, became dizzy and fell off into the water, which was at that time at a flood stage, a jam of logs being floated down.

He was carried down stream by the swift water and drowned before assistance could reach him. His body was recovered an hour later about a half mile below where he fell in.

Gigot was aged 21 years and came here not long ago from Greenfield, Wis., where his parents reside. He has a brother in the employ of the Booth-Kelly Co.

It was at first intended to ship the remains to Wisconsin for burial, and they were embalmed for that purpose, but the brother finally decided to bury them here.

## FREE MAIL DELIVERY JULY 1.

Mail Boxes Will Be Set up in a Few Days.

### TWO CENTS FOR DROP LETTERS.

Free mail delivery is soon to be a real thing to the city of Eugene. By July 1, if everything goes well, the carriers will leave your letters, your papers and your packages at your door. All the fix ups for the system have arrived and will soon be put in force. Sixteen mail boxes will be located in different parts of the city for the best accommodation of the public. The only thing that can delay the establishment of the system will be the delay of the postoffice department at Washington on passing on the examination papers of the applicants who took the civil service test at the High School a week ago Saturday. The results will probably be known in a few days.

The two making the best records will be selected by the department as regular carriers. A third will be chosen as a substitute in case one of the regulars is ill or as an assistant during holidays or busy periods. The regular carriers will receive \$600 a year for the first year. The substitute will be paid at the same rate for the time he is actively employed.

### WILL KEEP POSTOFFICE BOXES.

It is believed that most of the business men of the city will keep their boxes at the postoffice in order to get their mail immediately after train time. All who do not live near the postoffice will probably surrender the boxes. It is believed that all empty boxes thus made will be secured by people living in the country. At present the demand cannot be accommodated as all boxes are in use. The receipts of the office from this source will therefore remain the same. Country people are anxious to secure boxes, and more can be accommodated after July 1.

### TWO CENTS FOR DROP LETTERS.

Under the rules for free delivery offices all letters mailed to persons getting mail at this office must bear two cent stamps. Drop letters, invitations, business circulars, etc, can no longer be sent with one cent. The newspapers will also have to pay an advanced rate on all papers mailed to patrons of the free delivery office.
