Two Names and Two Results.

A large steamer was once wrecked because one of the sailors was named West. The vessel was outward bound from Rotterdam, and the sailor was on deck polishing some brasswork. Suddenly the captain called him and told him to go below. The second officer on the bridge heard the captain call out the man's name and thought it was an order to change the course of the vessel to west. He did so, and the result was that the ship ran on to a dangerous shoal. That name cost the owners of the vessel the sum of \$500,000.

During the Afghan war of 1879 a small British detachment gained a victory over a large body of the enemy by a mistaken order. A private named Vance, who had distinguished himself by several acts of bravery, was a great favorite with one of the officers, and during a skirmish the officer wanted him to carry a dispatch to the colonel in command of another detachment. The man was only a few yards away, and he called out, "Vance!" at the top of his voice. The men thought he had given the order "Advance!" and immediately rushed forward with such dash and spirit that the enemy broke and fled.

Monstrous Force of Tornadoes.
Much has been said about electricity as a factor for destructiveness in the various grating stormclouds known as cyclones, dreeches and tornadoes. In all of this voluminous mass of so called scientific opinions and deductions one fact seems to have been entirely overlooked—viz, the almost irresistible force of wind when moving with high velocity. When the velocity is but fifty miles an hour, the pressure of air in motion is equal to twelve pounds to the square foot, and when this velocity rises to a hundred miles per hour its force rises to the equivalent of 49.2 pounds to the square foot, the augmentation of force being always proportional to the square of the velocity.

It needs no further elaboration or amplification of this statement to convey to the intelligent reader an idea of the monstrous mechanical force of which such a rapid traveling mass of air must have a power great enough to tear down any structure that has yet been built by man or to uproot whole forests of the largest trees now growing on the surface of the earth.

BOHEMIA MINING NOTES.

Report That Jennings Bros. Uncovered Large Body of Free Milling Ore.

COTTAGE GROVE, June 14.—Report reaches here that a rich strike has been made in the Cottage Grove mine, Bohemia, now under control of the Jennings Bros. The mine has been lying dormant for some years, but a short time ago the above named parties took possession of it and after drifting about 25 feet they struck an immense quantity of free-milling ore, said to be as rich as any ever struck in the Helena, and at a depth of some 300 feet, a remarkable depth for free rock.

It is also reported that a vein of fine shipping ore, three and one-half feet thick, has been uncovered in Helena No. 2.

A shipment of ore brought down from the Hawthorn property a few days ago has created quite an excitement here. Some of the rock was placed in a gal-pail to wash it preparatory to placing it on the exhibit table at the company's headquarters, and upon removing it from the pan one of the boys panned the sediment, which resulted in almost a teaspoonful of pure gold being left in the bottom of the pan. The company now has a full crew of men at work and an immense amount of development work will be done this season.

Activity is the word now in Bohemia. Besides the numerous individual mine-owners now at work and arranging for a steady season, the LeRoy, Hawthorn, Helena No. 1, Helena No. 2, Champion and Musick are running full crews, while the Crystal expects to put on a steady crew within the next 30 days.

Arrangements are now being made by the LeRoy people to equip the mine with air compressors, drills and tools within the next 60 days, it requiring that time to get the machinery in place.

FAIRVIEW MOUNTAIN TUNNEL.

Arrangements for the commencement of work on the big tunnel starting from Champion creek canyon and to be driven at a depth of 1000 feet through Fairview mountain to the Musick mine, are now about completed, and work is expected to be commenced in the immediate future. This is one of the greatest and most far-reaching enterprises ever promulgated in the district, and means millions to the owners of property in the diggings. The tunnel when completed will be about a mile and a quarter long, and will tap many of the richest ledges in the district.
