A FIRE AT THE DEPOT.

A Car Load of Excelsior Was Ruined.

This afternoon at 2:30 o'clock as the south-bound passenger train was standing at the depot, flames were seen to be pouring from a box car standing on the side track in front of S H Friendly's warehouse and loaded with excelsior from the Eugene Excelsior Works.

The crowd at the depot rushed to the scene. Someone had presence of mind enough to slide the doors of the car shut, the crowd pushed the car away from the warehouse and the fire extinguishing apparatus was sent for. When the chemical engine and hose carts arrived the doors were thrown open and the flames soon extinguished.

Nearly 12 tons of excelsior was destroyed. The car holds an even 12 tons, and it lacked only one wagon load of being full. W J Royce, of the excelsior factory, when seen by a reporter at the fire, stated that the loss on the excelsior would be about \$250. The interior of the car was pretty badly burned and will probably have to be rebuilt.

As to the origin of the fire, Section Foreman Strawn who was working near by, said he saw two little boys, well known about town, playing in the car and saw one of them strike a match and set fire to the excelsior and then run away. Before he could reach the car the flames were beyond control.
