In Memoriam.

Sydney Sylvester Stephens died at his home in Notti valley, Lane county Oregon, Saturday June 14, 1902, after a lingering illness of cancer of the stomach, aged 70 years and 16 days.

Mr Stephens was born two miles below Hornellville, New York, May 29, 1836. He was the son of Benjamin Stephens who died in 1836. His grandfather, Elijah Stephens, was one of the first settlers in Cassioco valley.

In August, 1855, he came west to Cassioco, Stark county, Illinois, and after a month's residence went to Minnesota and worked on the government land survey. Returned to Illinois in 1856. Was there married to Mary J Sturtevant May 28, 1857, who preceded him nine years ago.

In January 1865 Mr Stephens and family left Illinois for Oregon, taking the isthmus route. They arrived at Portland then up the river by boat to Corvallis March 1, 1865.

He settled in the Notti valley fifteen miles westerly from Eugene in 1867, and made that his home until death, with the exception of eight months in 1895 when he resided in Eugene. Was elected a county commissioner in 1892 and served the term of two years.

He was the father of nine children, six boys and three girls. Three boys and one girl died nearly together nineteen years ago from a severe type of typhoid fever. Those surviving are Joseph M and Church A Stephens on the old home place. Clark M Stephens, Eugene, Mrs Loretta McCutcheon of Elmira, and Mrs Lucy Withrow, Reuben, Columbia county.

REGENTS' MEETING.

Prof. Lilley Dismissed—Professor Dearborn's Salary Raised.

At the annual meeting of the board of regents of the University of Oregon yesterday afternoon, but few matters engaged the attention of the board.

The most important matter attended to was the dismissal of Prof Geo Lilley, professor of mathematics. The reason for this action is not learned. One of the regents when asked the reason refused to say anything.

Prof Lilley has held the chair of mathematics since 1897. He was formerly president of the Washington agricultural college and before coming to Eugene was principal of one of Portland's public schools.

Another matter attended to was the raising of the salary of Prof R H Dearborn, of the mechanical department, from \$1000 to \$1200 per year.

Reports were read and accepted and the resignations of those professors who recently resigned were accepted.

BIG NEW SAWMILL

To Be Erected at Springfield By the Booth-Kelly Co.

OF IMMENSE CAPACITY.

SPRINGFIELD, June 18.—For the past two or three days, the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co has had surveyors at work locating a site for a large new sawmill at this place.

The new mill will be located just south of the S P depot, and will have a capacity greater than the Wendling mill which is 150,000 feet every 10 hours. The new one will probably have a capacity of 500,000 feet.

It is stated that the mill will be rushed to completion. The old mill here is now sawing out timbers for the new plant.

The erection of this mill means that there is now no doubt of the railroad bridge and connecting branch being built this year.

President Kelly and Manager Booth of the Booth-Kelly Co, are both out of the city today, and the above could not be verified, but it is certain that the mill will be built. In our interview with Mr Booth at the time the company purchased the Military wagon road grant of over 1,000,000 acres, he stated that one or more large mills will be erected soon and this is one of them. The article in today's issue taken from a Tacoma lumber paper also makes the statement that the company will erect a large mill at Springfield immediately.

CHANCELLOR STRONG.

Will Be Inaugurated at Kansas University With Great Eclat

The regents of the University of Kansas, during commencement week made preliminary arrangements for the inaugural exercises installing the new chancellor, Dr Frank Strong. The exercises will occur late in October or early in November, and great preparations are being made for the event. They announce:

"The board expects to make this an affair of state importance, and we hope to have with us the governor and staff, the state officers and the prominent school men of the state, and such other prominent citizens as we can induce to come. We think we can easily have an audience of five to six thousand."
