JUST A GENTLEMANLY DRUNK.

The court of inquiry in the case of the officers of the cruiser Chicago, imprisoned at Venice during the latter part of April for raising a disturbance in a cafe, have reported in their findings that two of the officers were "affected by liquor to a noticeable extent, but were not intoxicated in the ordinary meaning of the term." That is, we suppose, they could walk and talk.

That almost equals the finding of a Eugene recorder in early days, when he decided that an intoxicated man brought before him for obstructing the sidewalk with his person while sleeping off his "jag" was not guilty, his reason for the peculiar decision being that the man laid lengthwise on the walk.

At least that was the reason he gave, but, in fact, there was another reason. He was afraid of the man.

And well, too, for that man later burnt the eyebrows off the night-watch with his pistol flash as the officer passed the now Hoffman House corner, but met death a few minutes later only a few steps from where he attempted murder.

The Chicago's officers were on a gentlemanly drunk. That is how the court of inquiry dresses up its finding.

A SMOOTH VENETIAN SCHEME.

The New York Sun, commenting on the trouble the cruiser Chicago's officers got into at Venice through refusing to pay what they considered an extortionate charge for broken tableware, tells this very pretty story:

When a prosperous-looking foreigner who does not seem very familiar with the Italian language or the customs of Venice appear in this cafe, it is usually contrived to seat him at one of those trick tables. At the proper moment a waiter or somebody else in the employ of the restaurant gets into a dispute with the visitor and the foreigner is made as angry as possible. Then over goes the table and down go the glasses and crockery upon it.

Immediately a bill for \$25 or thereabouts for damages to the cafe's property is presented to the unwary stranger. If he fails to settle promptly the police are called in.
