BRITISH COMMERCIAL SPIRIT.

Have we been wasting sympathy on the non-progressive Boer? Treasury statistics for April, just given to the public, show that our exports to Africa for that month were greater than those to all South America, and more than double those of the preceding year. Of course the chief increase was to British South Africa, which took eighty-five per cent of our exports to that continent. While Great Britain pays the bills for the Boer war the United States gets much of the benefit from the opening up of that rich country to commerce.

Say what you please about the Englishman he makes business wherever he goes. And he does not surround himself with tariff and trade restrictions, but allows the world free field. It is the only policy that will win in the end. China tariff walls built about a country stifle and repress the commercial spirit. While they keep trade out they confine it to our own territory, excepting of course the export of raw materials; and that is a loss, as they should be turned into finished products at home. Trade, world-wide commercial activity, is the only true gauge of national greatness. And no nation ever became truly great without it. There has been no exception from Phoenicia till the present day.

COMMERCIAL "ECONOMIES."

Timberman. Twenty of the largest planing mills in Chicago have been united in a new corporation called the American Sash & Door Company. It is declared by promoters of the consolidation that its purpose is to effect certain economies in deliveries and in the purchase of raw material.

The "economies" in the purchase of raw materials mean that they expect to buy their material cheaper. The "economies" in deliveries are, also, all on the side of the mill men. The men who purchase their products will pay advanced prices, at least larger profits to the manufacturers. These trusts will be met and properly handled by the people in time. The slave driver no longer lashes the backs of black, human chattels. Commercial combinations will be met and debared from making chattels of whites and blacks alike.

HOW THE FIRST ROTHSCHILD DIED.

When Mayer Rothschild, the founder of the great Rothschild banking business, died in 1812, he called his sons around his bedside and said:

"Keep the law of Moses, remain united to the end; consult your mother before beginning any great business—keep in mind these three things, and the world will soon be long to you."

The five sons of Mayer Rothschild divided Europe into different sections, each one taking control of a certain part. One went to Paris; another to Vienna; a third to Naples; another to Frankfurt and the last to England. The houses they founded own a good part of the world now.

Doctor Browning of Philadelphia has made a record for high medical fee charges. He put in a bill against the estate of the late political leader and state senator, Chris. Magee, for \$190,070. The executor disallowed the bill, whereat the doctor waxed wrath and says he will sue for the full amount due him—\$350,000. The patient died. What would the doctor have charged had he got well?

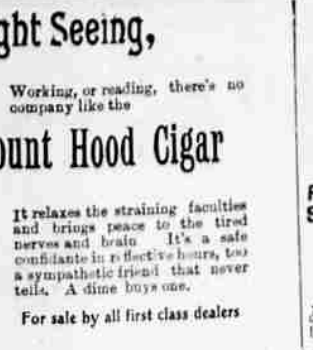

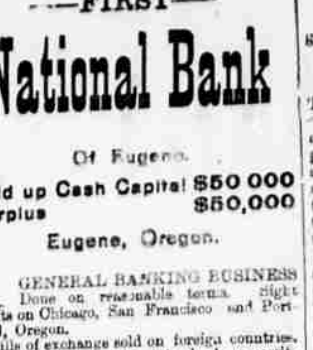
