WILL GO TO ENGLAND.

Dick Smith With Accompany Rowing Crew to the Old World.

Richard S (Dick) Smith, the well known and popular athlete who was graduated from the University of Oregon last year, was a member of the Columbia University rowing crew that won third place in the intercollegiate rowing races on the Hudson river Saturday. The eight-oared race was won by Cornell, with Wisconsin second and Columbia third. The last named crew defeated Pennsylvania, Georgetown and Syracuse.

Smith's position was No 4 and he was the only man on the crew who had not undergone the preparations of several seasons' work. There were more than 30 candidates for Smith's position, and friends of the young Oregonian are enthusiastic over his fine athletic work at Columbia.

Smith will spend the summer in New Hampshire and will accompany the Columbia crew to England in September.

FOUR NEW DANCES.—At the convention June 18, in New York, of the National Association of Dancing Masters of the United States and Canada, three new round dances and an original lancers have been chosen as the correct thing for the coming season. The new steps are known as the "Military dip," "Antlers gavotte," the "Olympia" and the "Drawing-Room Lancers." The first named is a waltz, differing from the old dip waltz danced a generation ago by having a dip to each move instead of every third movement.

COLLAR BONE BROKEN.—Little Emory Ingham, aged about 3 years, son of Mr and Mrs E H Ingham, residing on North Pearl street, while playing on the porch this forenoon about 11 o'clock, fell off the porch to the ground, a distance of about 8 feet, and sustained serious injuries. L. T. HARRIS.

Candidate for Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Lawrence T Harris, who was recently elected for the second time as a Representative from Lane county, has announced himself as a candidate for Speaker of the House of Representatives. Mr Harris was born in Lind



county in 1873. He received his early education in the schools of this city. Later he entered the University of Oregon, graduating with the class of 1893. Ambitious to obtain a first-class legal education, Mr Harris went to the University of Michigan Law school, finishing the course and being admitted to the bar in 1896. Returning to Eugene, he opened a law office, and was soon appointed Deputy Prosecuting Attorney for the Second Judicial District, a position he still holds. Two years ago Mr Harris was elected Representative from Lane county, and discharged the duties of the office in a creditable manner, being recognized as one of the leaders of the lower house. In the recent election he received a plurality of 1001 votes over C K Hale.

STATE TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

Headquarters for Teachers at Courthouse—Additional Lodging Wanted.

Preparations for the big meeting of the State Teachers' Association are moving along swiftly and smoothly.

Tomorrow a big banner will be stretched across Willamette street with the inscription, "Welcome Teachers of Oregon."

Headquarters for arriving teachers will be opened at the courthouse tomorrow, where local teachers will have the list of entertainment places and can assign the visitors. Badges indicating the reception committees, guide boys and members of the association will be distributed.

President Campbell, State Superintendent Acherman and other prominent officers will come up tomorrow afternoon on the train. Special cars from Portland and Salem and one or two from the West side will bring scores of delegates.

With regard to entertainment the committee still wishes additional places. About 450 visitors can now be accommodated with lodging while board can be amply provided for by the hotels and restaurants. The committee on entertainment consisting of Misses Ida Patterson, Kate Patterson, Kate Kelly and Principal Moore will assign those places first where guests are desired, and last where the houses are thrown open for accommodation.
