STAMP MILL IN OPERATION.

Five Stamps at the Uncle Sam
Mine Dropping.

Wm H Richardson, and E Hulise, of St Johns, Mich, two of the stockholders in the Uncle Sam Mining and Milling Co in the Blue River district on the Calipoola side of the mountains, arrived down yesterday from the mines.

Mr Richmond today informed a GUARD reporter that the five-stamp mill at the Uncle Sam mine started up Monday on a trial run, and it was found to operate very satisfactorily. From now on it is probable that the mill will be running steadily. Plenty of ore is on hand and it is among the richest in the whole district.

Mr Richmond said that the mill will soon be doubled in capacity, five more stamps now being on the road. The Uncle Sam mine is a scene of activity. A large amount of development has been and is now being done, 24 men being employed by the company at the present time.
