You Want a Water Filter.

If you take city water you want a faucet filter. And if you see the one Geo F Reynolds (at Courthouse Lodging House) has, you will buy it—as the writer did.

It is about 2 inches in diameter by 3 inches long, filled with finely powdered quartz. This is screwed on the faucet and the quartz filters the water. There is a screw on each end and by reversing it every few days the quartz is washed clear of the sediment it catches. Another advantage worth the cost. The fine quartz breaks the force of the water so it runs smooth without splashing in sink or vessel.

Bre Stock Ranch.—McMinnville Reporter: J J Henderson, formerly of this county, has leased 3000 acres of pasture land of G H Mureh at Coburg, Lane county, and bought of him 150 cows and 25 head of horses.
