LUTHER FISHER KILLED.

Former Eugene Young Man,
Son of Late W. P. Fisher.

NO PARTICULARS.

Sunday evening, P J McPherson received the following telegram from an undertaking firm at Seattle:

SEATTLE, June 29.

P J McPherson, Eugene, Ore:
I M Fisher killed. Notify his mother and wire instructions.

BUTTERWORTH & SON.

On account of the initials sent, "I M," it was not known at first who the man was, but upon inquiry it was learned that Luther Fisher formerly of this city and a son of the late W P Fisher, was up in the Sound country and that his second initial was "M." After wiring the operator at Seattle it was found that a mistake had been made in sending or receiving the message and an "L" had been substituted for an "M." It was then known that the man killed was Luther Fisher. No particulars were sent.

Mr McPherson sent word to the dead man's mother, Mrs Mary Fisher, at Portland, and it is probable that the body will be brought to Eugene for burial in the family lot in Oak Hill cemetery.

The deceased lived here with his parents many years. He attended the University of Oregon several terms and then studied law at Ann Arbor for two years. Returning to Eugene he enlisted in Co C, Second Oregon Volunteers, at the breaking out of the Spanish-American war, serving with credit with his company in the Philippines.

He left here shortly after he returned with his company from the Islands and has been here only once or twice since. He was aged about 29 years.

MINISTERS NAMED.

By the United Brethren Conference at Irving.

REV. MERRILL PRESIDING ELDER.

The Oregon conference of the United Brethren church closed Sunday night after a very harmonious and enthusiastic meeting at Irving.

The stationing committee made its report Sunday afternoon, and the assignment of ministers to the various churches in the district was made, but for some reason it has been impossible to obtain the list of assignments.

For the Eugene church Rev G D McDonald, just out of Philomath college, was assigned. He is said to be a fine young man, well qualified to fill the pastorate here, and he will no doubt give satisfaction to the congregation. For Irving and Goshen T E Armstrong, from Beaver, was appointed.

PRESIDING ELDER CHANGE.

The appointment of Rev Mr Blodgett as presiding elder of The Dalles district, as chronicled in Saturday's GUARD, was withdrawn at Mr Blodgett's own request, and Rev J T Merrill, now pastor of the Eugene church, was appointed instead. While Mr Merrill's friends here regret to see him leave they are pleased to learn that he has been honored with the appointment. He has served the church here faithfully for the last several years and has greatly increased the membership during his pastorate. The reason that Mr Blodgett declined the appointment is that he is a new man in the conference and that he is not well enough acquainted with the field.

MRS MCCORNACK DEAD.

She Expired Suddenly at her Residence This Morning.

Mrs Maria McCornack, a noble pioneer lady of Lane county, died suddenly from heart trouble at her residence, 144 West Seventh street, this morning about 2 o'clock.

She had been complaining of feeling ill for a few days, but it was thought there was nothing serious, and yesterday she was feeling much better. In the night time her daughter, Miss Mary, heard her moving about her room and asked her if she wanted anything. She replied that she did not, but shortly afterward when Miss McCornack entered the room she found her mother lying dead across the bed. The funeral will probably be held Wednesday, but further announcements will be made later.

Maria Eakin McCornack was born near Londonderry, Ireland, Jan 7, 1824. She came to America in 1838 with her parents who settled in Kane county, Ill. In 1842 she married Andrew McCornack. They crossed the plains with ox teams in 1853 and settled late in the fall near Olympia, Washington. In 1858 they came to Lane county, residing here ever since. Andrew McCornack died in 1872.

Twelve children survive them as follows: W R McCornack, of Florence; F A, H F and Miss Mary E McCornack, Mrs C M Collier and Mrs J E Stevenson, of Eugene; Dr W A McCornack, of Mendocino, Calif; E P McCornack, Salem; Mrs Dr E P Geary, of Portland; J K McCornack, of Palouse, Wash; Mrs F A Wells, of San Francisco, and Frank H McCornack, of Klamath Falls.

\$7,500 LOTTERY PRIZE.

THE TURNER CONVENTION.

Closed Yesterday After a Successful 10 Days' Session.

The big state convention and camp-meeting of the Christian church of Oregon which has been in session at Turner for ten days closed yesterday with the largest attendance of the whole session.

Despite the fact that an admission fee of 10 cents per head was charged at the gates to defray the expenses of the meeting thousands of people thronged the grounds from early till late, and hundreds of teams from points within a radius of 40 miles around Turner were tethered within the enclosure.

There were 75 or 100 camps in the grove, people who remained during the entire meeting. The site is an excellent one for camping, there being a splendid stream of water running close by, plenty of shade and good drinking water.

The tabernacle erected in 1892 by Mr and Mrs Turner, old pioneers of that section, is a huge structure, holding many thousands of people. It was completely filled at yesterday's service.

The principal attraction of the convention this year was Rev Charles Reign Sooville, A M, Li D, of Metropolitan Church of Christ, Chicago, Ill., who preached twice each day. O he ministers of state reputation delivered sermons, and many excellent papers were read on different phases of church work.

This Monday morning the work of breaking camp began. The Eugene people who were in attendance have about all returned home.
