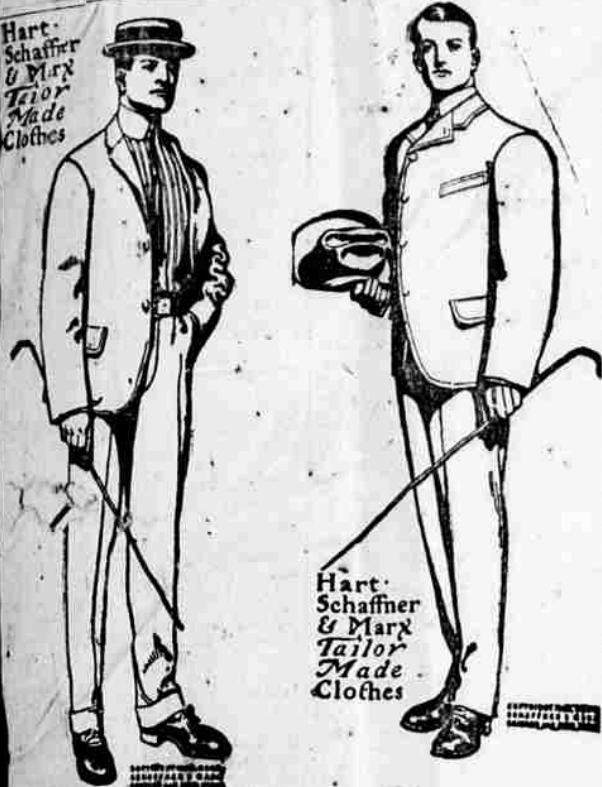

THE O N G ENCAMPMENT.

Site Has Been Changed at Albany.

The site for the National Guard Encampment to be held in Albany July 17 to 24 has been changed from Hackleman's Grove to Goltz Park about half a mile south of the original grounds selected. The commanding officers when they visited Albany concluded that the grounds at the grove, while a splendid place for a regimental encampment, was too small for the entire brigade and selected Goltz Park. The tents will be pitched on the old baseball grounds which is a splendid level open tract.

Father of 26.

BABYLON, L. I., June 30.—Oscar Darling, a civil engineer, became a father today for the 26th time. He lives at Amityville. He has twice married. His second wife, who was only 19 when she married, has given birth to 11 children. His first wife bore him 15 children. He is the largest family on Long Island and probably in the state. He has 12 boys and 14 girls, all of whom are living except five.

FUNERAL TOMORROW.

Remains of Luther M. Fisher Will Be Interred in Oak Hill Cemetery.

The following telegram was received by the GUARD at 12:16 o'clock today: ALBANY, Or., July 1. GUARD, Eugene, Ore: Publish funeral of Luther M. Fisher at Oak Hill July second.

HENRY FISHER. A firing squad from the Philippine veteran company of this city, of which the deceased was a member, will attend the funeral, as well as many other of his friends.

HOW HIS DEATH OCCURRED. But meager particulars have been obtained as to the death of young Fisher. The account of the accident was in none of the Portland papers, but from Geo. Gross, who drove down to Irving this afternoon where the body has arrived for interment we learn that he was in the railroad yards at Seattle when a switch engine struck him and killed him instantly.

THE FREE DELIVERY.

Was Inaugurated in Eugene This Morning.

C. D. Chorpene and Glenn Chessman began their work of delivering mail to residents inside the city limits, under the new free delivery system just inaugurated, this morning. Mr. Chorpene has the district west and Mr. Chessman east of Willamette street.

WANI GATES PARDONED.

Move in Behalf of the Forger Who Was Sent up From Lane.

SALEM, July 1.—A petition was filed in the office of Governor Geer yesterday asking for the pardon of John H. Gates, who is serving a term in the penitentiary for forging the name of H. W. Corbett to a check at Eugene about a year ago.

Gates is the State House janitor who figured in a sensational transaction during the Legislative session of 1901, when he made a hasty trip to Albany with \$1500 obtained from an unknown source.

It is represented in his behalf that he was a good citizen prior to the commission of the offense for which he was convicted and that he will be a good citizen again if pardoned. The petition is signed by about 150 Marion county's leading citizens.

SIGNED BY THE PRESIDENT.

Indian War Pension Bill Is Now a Law.

The Indian War Pension Bill was signed by the president last Saturday and is now a law. Congressman Tongue secured the pen with which the bill was signed as a trophy of the important event, which will be forwarded to the Oregon association.

Claimants may now write directly to Congressman Tongue and secure the necessary blanks, containing questions which must be answered plainly and satisfactorily and sworn to before a notary public. This will thus save any expense more than the charges of a notary. There are quite a number of Lane county's best pioneer citizens who are veterans of the Indian Wars, who will place their claims at an early date.

Enough of Thunder Mountain.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 30.—George Foster, a Kansas City newspaper man of good standing, who went into the Thunder Mountain district, writes from Meadows, Idaho: "We are on our way back from the biggest mining fake ever sprung. The only gold in the whole country is what has been carried in the teeth of pilgrims like us."

KISSENGER TRAGEDY

A Statement Found in Kissenger's Pocket

SHOWED EVIDENCE OF SHATTERED MIND

Boise Capital News, June 28. KISSENGER'S BROTHER COMING. At 1 o'clock this morning the Capital News received the following message:

EUGENE, Ore., June 27. Capital News, Boise, Idaho: Notify the coroner of Boise county to hold the body of Kissenger until I come. Will start tonight. CHAS. M. KISSENGER.

This message was phoned at once to Pearl and the coroner made arrangements in accordance with it. The bodies of Kissenger and Mrs. Garner will reach here this afternoon.

KISSENGER'S MOVEMENTS.

Kissenger's movements since his arrival in Boise were shrouded in mystery. He left Eugene June 18, with this point as his destination, and if he came through would reach here on the 20th. The date of his arrival here could not be ascertained, although all the hotel registers and lodging houses were visited, but none of them admit ever having seen him.

The first trace of his movements after arrival in Boise is at Guilford's barn. He was there either Wednesday or Thursday morning and secured a horse, returning it later in the day. After dinner Thursday he was at the Boise National Bank and turned over a certificate of deposit for \$250, and drew \$20. A new certificate for the balance was issued him and he left the institution without making any remarks. This certificate was found on his person by the coroner.

KISSENGER LEFT STATEMENT.

PEARL, June 28.—W. T. Kissenger left a statement dated at Boise, Idaho, June 27, 1902, which was found in his pocket, but was so badly written that it could only be partially deciphered. In this statement he says that he left his wife and child to marry Mrs. Garner. Mrs. Garner lead him to leave her sister and promised to marry him if he could get a divorce.

About the time he got the divorce he heard that she had married her present husband.

He loved her so dearly he could not live without her.

As he could not love her in the flesh he decided to kill her and himself, so they could be together in heaven.

Letter shows marked evidence of a shattered mind.

In his statement Mr. Kissenger blamed the relatives of the woman for leading her to desert him.

There was found on the body of the deceased a certificate of deposit in the First National Bank, of Boise, for \$250, \$10 in cash, a receipt for taxes from the sheriff of Latah county, Oregon, a photo of the dead woman and a lock of hair supposed to be hers.

PENDELTON EAST OREGONIAN TELEGRAPHIC ACCOUNT.

PEARL, June 28.—About 3 o'clock Friday afternoon the man rode into town and put up his horse at a livery stable. He then called a boy to him and said:

"Sonny do you know where W. A. Garner lives?" The boy replied that he did. Then the stranger said:

"Here is 25 cents, my boy, and I want you to show me the house."

The boy took the proffered coin and guided the stranger to the Garner house, where he saw him enter. Miss Alice Foster, who was visiting Mrs. Garner, stood in an adjoining room when the stranger entered the room where Mrs. Garner was.

THE TRAGEDY.

She saw the man seize Mrs. Garner around the waist and draw her close to him. He then drew a revolver, placed the muzzle of the weapon behind the woman's head and fired. Miss Foster was transfixed with horror. She could not scream or move. The man then held the woman, who slipped down in his arms somewhat, and shot again, the bullet entering the right cheek and crashing through the brain the same as the first had done. Miss Foster then started to run. She had to pass close to the person in making her escape to the open air. As she passed the man laid the lifeless body of the woman on the floor and looked at it for a moment. He then raised the weapon to his own head and fired just as Miss Foster got out of the room. Miss Foster heard the report and the heavy fall of the body.

THE HUSBAND'S GRIEF.

W. A. Garner was notified of the tragedy and hurried home. He was overcome with grief, and when he saw his wife's body lying in his own arms, he wept for his reason.
