White Railroad Damage Suit.

The suit of Mrs K M White against the Southern Pacific Railroad Co for \$5000 damages for the death of her husband, William H White, in the depot yard at Salem on December 8, 1901, was commenced in the Portland circuit court Saturday morning.

White, ("Billy," as he was called about Junction City where he resided for many years), was engineer for the defendant corporation. The complaint states that certain of the ties of the railroad company a short distance south of the depot at Salem "were rotten to such an extent that they would not hold the spikes which were driven therein to hold the rails in place." The spikes were rusted and weathered and would not hold either rails or fishplates in place. The switch, also, was out of order. The flanges of the engine wheels were badly worn and the tow rails used in connection were out of repair; that the engine was thereby thrown from the track, causing his death.

You Want a Water Filter.

If you take city water you want a faucet filter. And if you see the one Geo F Reynolds (at Courthouse Lodging House) has, you will buy it—as the writer did.

It is about 2 inches in diameter by 3 inches long, filled with finely powdered quartz. This is screwed on the faucet and the quartz filters the water. There is a screw on each end and by reversing it every few days the quartz is washed clear of the sediment it catches.

Another advantage worth the cost. The fine quartz breaks the force of the water so it runs smooth without splashing in sink or vessel.
