EUGENE TEAM BEATEN

At Both Grants Pass and Ashland

WILL PLAY ROSEBURG TOMORROW

In the baseball game at Grants Pass Sunday afternoon Hampton Bros' team of this city was badly defeated by the "Alerts" of Grants Pass by a score of 18 to 8.

The Eugene boys played in hard luck from start to finish. In the second inning Wes Whitesaker, the crack shortstop, was hit by the ball over the eye while at bat, cutting a big gash and putting him out of the game. He was taken to town where a physician took several stitches to sew up the cut. This accident necessitated the changing of the players around, and most of them being unaccustomed to their new positions, some very costly errors were made. The Eugene team's batting was good but their fielding was very bad. Those who saw the game say it was a poor one on both sides.

THE CHERRY CROP.

About One-Third of It Spoiled by Rain.

Many have asked how badly the cherry crop was damaged by the recent heavy rains. To ascertain the facts in the matter a reporter this morning interviewed W G Allen, manager of the Allen Canning and Packing Co's cannery in this city, in regard to the matter.

Mr Allen stated that at first it was thought that a good part of the crop was spoiled, but it now turns out that only about one-third of it was damaged. This is a careful estimate made by Mr Allen who is in a position to know.

A force of women and girls are at work at the cannery putting up a choice lot of cherries, those that are cracked being culled out.

The work of canning raspberries has also commenced, quite a lot of them now being on hand.
