### LEG AMPUTATED.

Geo. Goodall Undergoes Another Operation.

The condition of George Goodall, who has been confined in Good Samaritan Hospital for some weeks with an injured knee, has been growing worse and worse, until Saturday his leg had to be amputated, as the last hope of saving his life, says the Oregonian.

His trouble dates from last September, when he was confined with an injured knee. The trouble was not regarded as very serious and his knee was treated with various remedies, but grew worse and worse. About a month ago he was brought to the hospital and an operation performed, when he had a very close call, and it was with the most extreme measures that he was restored from the effects of the anesthetic, so weak had he become from his long suffering. The doctors hoped to save his leg, and the operation consisted of cutting into the knee and removing a part of the bones which had become tubercular. This, it was expected, would remove the cause of the trouble, but still the knee would not heal. Saturday the wound was again opened and an amputation was deemed necessary. He stood the operation in fine shape, and it is thought that he will soon recover.

Goodall has been for several years a student at the State University, and was a leader both in student ability and athletics. He was a member of last year's football team, for several years a member of the University track team, and one of the best debaters the University ever turned out. His sickness occurred shortly before the time that he was to graduate, and he was not able to complete his course. So highly was he regarded by his professors, however, that he was granted his diploma without an examination.

### NEW GOVERNMENT SURVEY.

Townships to Be Sectionized in Lane County.

Twenty-two townships are to be sectionized this summer along the line of the grant of the Oregon Central Military road across the Cascade forest reserve. The townships contain considerable valuable timber land, and the demand for the various tracts has impelled the wagon road company to make application for the survey, making a money deposit for the expense of the work, which is to be apportioned out to the United States deputy surveyors as follows:

A L Porter, of Norton, Or, will survey townships 19 S, R 2 E; 20 S, R 1, 2 and 3 E; 21 S, R 2 and 4 E; 22 S, R 3 and 4 E; 23 S, R 3 E.

L E Wilkes, of Hillsboro, will survey townships 23 S, R 4 and 5 E; 24 S, R 3 and 4 E.

H C Perkins, Fred Mench and A M Krating, of Grants Pass, will survey townships 24 S, R 5, 6 and 7; 25 S, R 5, 6 and 7. The work will begin as soon as the bonds of the bidders have been approved. The land lies along the Middle Fork of the Willamette river in Lane county.
