At any rate our billion dollar congress has adjourned and will make no more excessive appropriations for a time.

The reference in the papers to the worst criminal of the age as "a perfect gentleman" ought to be sufficient to suppress the publication.

Range troubles in Eastern Oregon are beginning to make things unpleasant. Undoubtedly a number of lives will be lost before the settlers and rangers, the cattle men and the sheep men settle down to a peace basis.

The two men who started from New York for England in a thirty-foot launch are of that class who delight in a little suppressed glory. There is less occasion for attempting this feat than for trying to reach the north pole. If they succeed, what have they done?

Improvements are being made in wireless telegraphy until old companies are beginning to view the progress with some apprehension. As soon as the new system gives proof of practicability, however, the wire lines will buy up the new patents and sell their wire lines to the government.

What kind of guards do they have at the Oregon penitentiary, anyway? The one who managed to fire off his gun the other night when he thought he saw a man's hat over the wall, is being praised for his vigilance and bravery. But in reality he did just what he ought not to have done—soared his prize away. Suppose it to be true that an intruder were attempting to gain entrance to the yard by scaling the walls, and the guards had been keen of perception as he seems to profess. Then there would be one proper thing to do. That is to take the intruder and keep him—not to drive him away. This might easily have been done by the guard had he simply pretended not to see the head over the wall and dropped where he could not be seen, but where he could see his game and get it after it had crossed the wall and was inside the yard. That intruder should have been admitted to the enclosure and not allowed to escape. The guards down there have been so long without anything to do that they need a little polishing up.

The furey of Monday in the corn dealings on the Chicago Board of Trade is a reminder of the conditions that existed through the great corn producing belt of the Mississippi and Missouri valleys. Shrewd observers saw last August what might be expected and keen speculators have profited this time by taking advantage of natural conditions, rather than by crafty methods and shrewd manipulation of the markets, as is very commonly the case.

The excessively dry season of last year is the foundation for the 90-cent price for corn. During July and August of last year the great corn producing regions were parched and brown. A good crop was not to be seen on any field, and farmers were cutting and feeding what little they had as fodder to the cattle. Grass was short and everything had to be fed out, so that when winter came it was with difficulty that stock was carried through. It did not require great foresight to tell the dealer and the capitalist to buy corn last fall and that this spring he would be as sure to receive a good profit on his investment as he is that morning will come after night. Fortune

again came to the holders last week when severe storms were reported as doing great destruction to crops all over the country. This at least gave warning that only a partial crop would be expected this year, and this, following the shortage from last year was the signal to buy corn and the price is up on account of the demand. The conditions causing this are natural, and low price corn need not be expected for another year. It may also be suggested that the price of cereals here on the coast will probably be stimulated, as there will be a demand for something to take the place of corn.
