Mr. Congressmen, this is most too careless a manner for you to be dispensing the people's money. A mere trifle of \$206,000,000 is supposed by a republican congress to require no itemized accounting.

Without a doubt Mayor Williams is cringing about at least an appearance of reform in Portland. It would be rash to say gambling and vice is stopped, but the public exhibition of them is much less than it has been. The casual observer walking along the streets does not necessarily have his attention called to the public places where vice and gambling reign. Mayor Williams evidently means to suppress some of the dens for which the metropolis is notorious.

Here is the way Henry Watterson is reported to have roasted the president while in Spokane on his recent visit. He said he was "an aggressive, unfledged soldier of fortune, who by force of a series of lucky chances inside of three years had literally rough-riden his way from a subordinate desk in the navy department to the White House." Of his administration

policy he decried his "one mailed foot in Washington and the other in Manila, its pockets were stuffed with reports which it dare not publish; that it eaves the flag which it has discredited in the sight of heaven and before men by exclaiming 'the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States be blown! Up with the banners of absolutism and arbitrary power. As Russia is in Poland shall we be in Luzon. All hail imperial splendor. Commerce is king!'"
