THE ENCAMPMENT.

Contracts for Supplies Let—A Huge Flag Pole.

Albany Democrat: The camp promises to be the best in the history of the state and organization.

Arrangements are being completed which will give the soldiers the best privileges to be secured.

A driven well on the grounds will furnish cold water. Pipes will run to different parts of the camp.

Last night a 120 foot flag pole arrived on four cars on the C & E, the pole being the compliments of the Chantlaim Co, and the carriage that of the railroad company. It is said to be the highest pole from a single stick ever raised in the state.

The quartermaster's department is to be in charge of Major F. S. Bennett, who will arrive tomorrow with a force of twenty men to prepare for the encampment. Contracts have been let in his department as follows: To Louis Zalesdorf for 5 tons of white oak, Bransberry & Wheeler 7,579 feet of lumber, F. E. Allen & Co. 20 cords second growth dry fir wood, sawed twice and 20 gallons of kerosene oil, M. Sanders & Co., 11 tons of baled straw.

In the commissary department under Major Moore, the Albany Produce & Butter Co. received the contract for the butter to be delivered by Conn & Huston, Tomlinson & Holman for sugar and salt, the Albany Dressed Beef Co. for meat, Allen & Co., vegetables and flour, and the bread by a Portland or Salem firm.

The grounds will be improved by Albany business men and will be a credit to the occasion.
