TO ALBANY TOMORROW.

Local Military Organizations Preparing for Encampment.

The big brigade encampment of the Oregon National Guard opens tomorrow. The local organizations are today making all preparations to leave for Albany on the 1:42 train tomorrow afternoon, arriving at their destination about an hour and a half later, and marching from the depot to the camp grounds only a short distance south-east.

The band and Co's A and C will go down with almost their entire enlisted force, and, including Col Moran and his staff, considerable more than 100 men will attend the encampment from here.

It is understood that the men will be kept pretty closely in camp which is in keeping with good discipline. While the camp will be somewhat of an outing, it is for the purpose of instruction and not for fun.
