THE BOHEMIA MINES.

Surprises in Store for Mining World When Railroad is Completed.

Astorian: J. L. LeRoy, of the LeRoy Mining Company, whose properties are located in the Bohemia district in Lane county, is in town for a few days. Mr. LeRoy states that with the completion of the railroad now building from Cottage Grove to tap the rich mines in this district that there will be some surprises in store for the mining world in the development and opening up of some of the immense gold-bearing veins of quartz located in and around Bohemia. The road into this section will be self-supporting aside from the mines on account of tapping an extensive timber belt, which has been practically untouched heretofore on account of the impossibility of getting it transported to market.

Tillamook.—A new four-room school building is to be erected here at a cost of \$4500.

Pendleton.—Nearly 10 per cent of the Umatilla wheat crop has been ruined by the high winds of the last two days.

Astoria.—Many small scows were wrecked here in Monday night's wind storm. No lives were lost, although some narrow escapes are reported.

Fort Stevens.—A moss house at the old army barracks here was destroyed by fire Monday night. The value of the building was small.
