Children and Crime.

With regard to capital crimes, by the ancient Saxon law the age of twelve years was established for the age of possible discretion, "when first the understanding might open," and thence till the offender was fourteen it was "about the age of puberty." In which he might or might not be guilty of a crime, according to his natural capacity or incapacity. Under the age of twelve it was held that he could not be guilty in will, neither after fourteen could he be supposed to be innocent.

Since the time of Edward III, the law appears to have been more desirous to measure the capacity of doing ill or contracting guilt by the delinquent's understanding and judgment rather than by any specific age after the age of seven was reached. Under seven years of age an infant cannot be guilty of felony, for then, as Blackstone says, a felonious discretion is almost an impossibility in nature, but at eight years old he may be guilty of felony.

The same author says that under fourteen, though an infant shall be, prima facie, adjudged to be delinquent, yet if it appear to the court and jury that he was delinquent and could discern between good and evil, he may be convicted and suffer death.—London Lancet.

She picked it up with a little gasp of joy, which was quickly chased away by a look of doubt.
