A HUMAN CURIOSITY.

Man With Three Legs and Two Hearts.

One of the greatest curiosities in deformed humanity ever seen in Eugene is here at present, having been here several days. The unfortunate individual is George Lippert. He has three legs, three feet and fifteen toes. These are visible. He has been told by surgeons of Bellevue hospital, New York, that he has two hearts, and by placing one's ear to his chest the statement appears to be true.

Lippert has pictures of himself wherein he had clothed each leg separately and used the three extremities in walking. A number of years ago he was being exhibited with a side-show, the circus train was wrecked and one of his legs was badly crushed. It is now bent back and useless for walking, although he can move it entirely independent of the other one.

NEED OF A RAILROAD.

People on the Siuslaw Now Pay Exorbitant Freight Rates.

Portland Telegram: Lane county people living on the coast are kicking at what they term excessive freight rates. Referring to a mower, weighing 740 pounds, on which there were \$11 charges from Portland to Hegets, consigned to R Griffith, the writer, H A Salsbury, who has interested himself, says in a letter to the board of trade:

"Such exorbitant charges amount to downright robbery, and we will rejoice when the business men will open a way for traffic between Portland and coast points."

Secretary Moore, of the board of trade, says the quickest way for the people in that section is to start agitation for a railroad. The people there are the most interested, and if they would get the thing started by gathering data and comparative costs, with the promise of a bonus as a guarantee of good faith, he has no doubt there are Portland people who would take the matter up, or at least interest themselves to the extent of securing Eastern capital to build the road. The secretary says such a railroad could tap other coast points and is something of which that country is very much in need.

There is a probability that the Great Central railroad to be built from Salt Lake to Coos Bay via Eugene will touch at Florence and other Siuslaw points.

INFANT FOUND MURDERED.

Young Girl Alleged to Have Killed Her Child.

PRINEVILLE, Or, July 18.—The body of an infant was unearthed by dogs here Wednesday in the rear of a harness store. The matter was reported to the coroner who is making an investigation. Miss Eliza Barnard, a young woman, is said to have confessed to the crime but refuses to divulge the name of the father of the child. The remains of the child had been interred 10 days ago, and were covered by about 20 inches of earth. The infant had been strangled and also struck a blow over the head with a blunt instrument.

SACKS ARE AWAY UP.

Eight Cents a Piece is the Price Now Asked.

Pendleton East Oregonian. Eight cents a piece for sacks! This is the price the farmers are compelled to pay for sacks in which to put their 1902 wheat and barley crops, and is the highest figure asked for them for several years. The price started at 7 cents a few weeks ago and immediately after the dealers found that there would be immense crops all over the country the price was advanced to 8 cents.

In speaking of the raise E W McCosum, representing the Northwestern Warehouse Co, said that there was apparently no reason for the raise more than that the sacks were in a combine and the dealers found they could get 8 cents as easy as 7.

The farmers have to have sacks and if they were 10 cents it would cut the number consumed very little. 8 x number is a good price for grain bags. In fact they have sold for less and the dealers were making a good profit from them.

Binding twine has also advanced to 15 cents a pound which is the highest it has ever been in this country.
