To pursue Tracy through Clarke, Cowitz, Lewis, Thurston, Pierce, Kitsap, Snohomish and King counties has cost these counties \$10,000. In this state he has slain three officers, desperately wounded one, who may not recover, and assassinated his partner, Merrill.
