SEATTLE, July 24.—The officials at the Puget sound navy yard are in receipt of the information from the navy department at Washington, D. C., that the battleship Oregon, now at the navy yard, is to be ordered to the China station and will sail as soon as she can make ready for the trip. With the Oregon gone, this leaves but one ship, the Wisconsin, on the Pacific coast station, as the Philadelphia is out of commission at the Mare Island yard.
