## A MODEL RESIDENCE

E C Smith's New House Will Be One of the Finest in Eugene.

The work on the new residence of E C Smith on the corner of East Ninth and Hilliard streets is fast progressing under the supervision of Contractor N B Alley. The house will be two and one-half stories high over a large stone basement 25x35 feet in the clear. The structure sets upon a wall of cut stone which, under the lower, reaches the windows. The first floor will be divided into six rooms exclusive of closets, porches, etc. The drawing room is large, 19x25 feet and the library room 20x25 feet, having a fine fire place. The reception and dining rooms will be finished in core ceiling and the library in ceiling blocked with beams. For its size it will be very roomy and its conveniences many. It can be lighted either by gas or electricity. Heat will be supplied by furnace. It will have many other accommodations, such as conservatory, parlour-room, etc, but space will not permit of their mention. For studied plan and commodious arrangement, Mr Smith's new home can not be surpassed by any in the city. The cost of the building complete will be \$4,500.
