THE EVENING NEWSPAPER.

The increase in the circulation, influence and prestige of the evening newspaper during the last decade are the phenomena of newspaperdom.

This statement is not a haphazard one. It is confirmed by the United States census.

In 1891 there were two evening newspapers printed to every morning newspaper. In 1900 there were three evening newspapers printed to one morning newspaper.

Has the demand for the morning papers fallen off or the demand for the evening papers increased? Both.

The afternoon paper is the paper of the masses. The merchant and the professional man read the morning paper, but these are a very small proportion of a newspaper's constituency. And even they scan it hastily.

The evening paper comes to the home at the leisure hour. The head of the house, the wife and the children all have time to read it. Together man and wife discuss the news and plan the next day's program, whether of pleasure or of buying.

It is for this reason that the evening newspaper is sought as an advertising medium. It reaches the larger number of the purchasing public at a time when they have leisure to read and digest.

In every city in the United States, save possibly New York, the evening newspaper is outgrowing the morning editions.—St. Paul News.

AN EASTERN NEWS ITEM.

"Harry Tracy, the escaped Oregon convict, still has the militia captured in the woods, and single handed and without arms he is resisting all efforts to surrender them. He demands a ransom of \$75 a head, and girls who have sweethearts in the militia are trying to raise the money to get them out, though women whose husbands are prisoners are not so zealous. Tracy has allowed the men to communicate with the outside world, and they say they are treated with courtesy and kindness. Tracy is a very gallant man. He went to the walls of the prison yesterday to render aid to a woman in distress. When he appears the men on the streets flee."

There is a sad lack of harmony in the national republican party. Certain of the party leaders are in favor of a reduction in the tariff on some of the highly protected manufactured goods which enable the trusts which manufacture them to reap an enormous profit, and enable them to sell their goods in this country at a price from 25 to 50 per cent higher than they charge in the foreign market. Other leaders are strenuously opposed to any reduction, and insist upon the full Dingley tariff. The Democrats are not slow in taking advantage of this split in the Republican ranks, and they are framing up a national campaign on the lines which gave them their only success in thirty years—"tariff reform." Should Patterson be elected governor of Pennsylvania he would head the national Democratic ticket, and with the blunders of the past unrepresented and on a tariff reform platform it would be a mighty pretty fight.

The expansion of this government now amount to \$2,500,000 per day, and still there is great clamoring to get on the pay roll. The ship of state may yet have to join syndicate to increase its profits.
