After he has wiped off that cross of oil from the rim he forms seven other crosses on it, but only one of them within. The bell is censured, more psalms are sung and prayers are put up for its welfare. After this feast and banquetings are celebrated just as at a wedding."—Gentleman's Magazine.

The music has a kind of drum-drum air and but very little variation. Their entertainments are of long duration and are generally during the day. The plays are almost invariably tragic. The admission fee is small.
