TRACY SEEN AGAIN. JUNCTION NEWS.

Outlaw Spends Day at Wen- atchee Ranch.

HEADED SOUTH FROM THERE.

SPOKANE, Aug. 1.—A Wenatchee
special to the Spokesman-Review says:
From 10 o'clock yesterday morning
until 9 o'clock at night, Harry Tracy,
the notorious outlaw, was an unwell-
come guest at the ranch of W. A. San-
ders and S. J. McEldowney, six miles
down the Columbia River. Tracy
came out of the Cascade, riding one
horse, with a pack on another, and
leading a third in reserve. He carried
a Winchester and two revolvers. He
took dinner and supper at the ranch,
keeping the men well covered with
his rifle.

Toward evening he forced McEldow-
ney to bring him two fresh horses and
lost his loaded animals. He then
took Sanders' saddle and ordered Mc-
Eldowney to go with him to a band
ferry 10 miles down the Columbia, but
Mrs. McEldowney began to cry, so
Tracy said he would not insist on that,
and left alone. He threatened that if
his presence were made known he
would return and do some killing. He
headed south.

The man tallied exactly with Tracy's
description, even to the mole on his
face. He gave a complete account of
his experience since escaping from Sal-
em, including the killing of Merrill
and his narrow escape from capture at
Seattle. He said that two of the horses
he took from a sheep camp in the
mountains, and the third was given
him by a prospector.

BOHEMIA SMELTER.

Ought to Be Built at Eugene or Cottage Grove.

State Journal: If the proposed
smelter for the Bohemia mines should
be located 10 or 20 miles this side of the
mines, as proposed, it would not be as
favorable a location as if placed at Cot-
tage Grove or Eugene. At Eugene it
would be equally convenient for Bo-
hemia, Blue River and the Fall Creek
country along the Middle Fork of the
Willamette. Railroads would then
soon be built from Eugene up the Mc-
Kenzie and up the Middle Fork, and
a great mining district would be opened
up to furnish ore for the smelter. Near
the railroad and river a few miles east
of Eugene would be a good site for a
smelter.

A SURVEYING CONTRACT.

H. C. Perkins Will Leave in Few Days for Upper Willamette Country.

H. C. Perkins, of Grants Pass, former-
ly of Lane county, was in the city yester-
day or two ago preparing to take a sur-
veying party into the mountains at the
head of the Middle Fork of the Willa-
mette. He has been awarded the
contract to survey six townships along
the line of the Oregon Central Mil-
itary wagon road land grant, where it
crosses the Cascade Forest Reserve, and
thinks the job will take between two
and three months to finish.

His party will be composed of seven
men, two being carpenters, two chain-
bearers, two axmen and a cook. Six
pack horses will be used in transport-
ing the camp outfit, and the trip will
be somewhat of a picnic, although it
will involve climbing up steep hills
and cutting paths through dense
brush.

The party will go around by Grater
Lake in order to reach the scene of the
new survey, but this portion of the
trip can be taken by wagon road from
Grants Pass.

EUGENE-MAPLETON STAGE.

The California, Oregon and Idaho Co. Took Possession This Morning.

The Eugene-Mapleton stage line
which has heretofore been conducted
by E. Bangs was turned over this morn-
ing to the California and Idaho Stage
Company. The stage is daily except
Sunday and will have Eugene head-
quarters at the Wells-Fargo Express
office. R. M. Donahue who has the
contract for carrying the mails has em-
ployed the above named company to
do the work for him. He will act as
agent for the line at this end of the
route.

The line will be equipped with two
new stage-coaches about August 15th.
Traffic is good over the route and busi-
ness is growing larger every year.

Corvallis, represented the defendant.
