"EXCELSIOR" MINE SOLD.—The Excelsior mine known also as the Chauncy Dale claim was formally sold yesterday to the Uncle Sam Mining and Milling Company of Blue River for \$11,000. The position of the Excelsior mine in relation to the claims owned by the Uncle Sam Company made it very desirable that the whole group should be under one control for operation, hence the transfer. The company will soon add another five-acre mill to the present capacity, making in all ten stamps.
