A CONDITION.

From the Philadelphia Saturday Evening Post.

Now that we have actually enacted law, after three quarters of a century agitation, providing for the construction of an isthmian canal by the United States, we are giving our attention to the ditch we are about to dig. We do not fully realize that before we get that ditch we shall have something else hardly less important—to wit, a new colony.

The law as passed provides that hereafter we begin the construction of the canal we must secure the perpetual, exclusive control of a strip of territory, at least six miles wide, from sea to sea. If that cannot be obtained from Columbia we must try to get it from Nicaragua and Costa Rica. There can be no canal without it.

Now, "exclusive and perpetual control" may sound better in Latin-American ears than "annexation," but in substance it is the same thing. Practically what we propose to do is to annex a strip of territory six miles wide along the line of the canal. On the Panama route that would give us about 270 square miles of land; on the Nicaragua route about 1,000. In the one case we should have a colony about four times the size of the District of Columbia; in the other we should have one almost as large as Rhode Island.

It is a satisfaction to feel that the prosperity of our new colony is assured from the start. There will be no hanging around the doors of the Capitol waiting for Congress to perform its "plain duty" in the matter of the tariff. The canal, first in construction and then in operation, will make perennial good times on the isthmus. The commerce of the world will flow year by year through that six-mile strip. American towns will spring up along the great ditch and reach out for the trade of the southern continent. And on the principle that "to him that shall be given" Congress will probably decide to take off the duties on isthmian sugar. Good luck to the youngest of Uncle Sam's infants!

WOMAN IN JAPAN.

There is no better evidence of the progress being made in Japan than the decision of a Japanese court the other day that a wife who refused to obey a tyrannical order from her husband was not compelled to do so when the order comported not with reasonable demands of consideration on his part.

It was not long ago that Japanese women were chattels at the command of their husbands or fathers. They had no rights that the law respected. They were slaves. They were less considered than were the brutes, so far as concerned the finer sensibilities. It is true that usually Japanese men were not exceedingly brutal physically and that in many respects Japanese women were better situated than those of other "heathen" countries. But, to propose to question the authority of a Japanese husband a decade or two ago would have been to propose what was not understandable by the average Japanese mind.

The recent incident is significant, indeed, upon the theory that a nation treats its women as it rightly governed.

It is calculated to engender self-complacency on the part of Americans to reflect that perhaps the major portion of the influence that has transformed Japan has emanated from the United States.—Portland Journal.

W. E. Coman, of the S. P., has been writing to the different boards of trade and commercial clubs, recently visited by him and the Harriman representatives, urging the earlier issuance of suitable immigration literature for distribution in the East. In view of the approaching remarkable low rates for people of the Middle East who desires to look over this country, this is something that should be attended to at once if it is effective. It is believed that there will be the biggest crowd yet here, so that Lane county should be in early if it desires to do something in the matter. The S. P. declares its purpose of doing everything possible to assist in building up this country.
