CITY ROCK CRUSHER AT WORK

3,500 Cubic Yards of Crushed Gravel Going on Eugene's Streets.

Mr M D Bissell, of Henderson, yesterday morning started up the city rock crusher on the gravel bar about 100 yards below the river bridge. Mr Bissell has taken the contract of putting 3,500 cubic yards of crushed gravel on the streets. At present he is employing twelve teams and seventeen men, and he will increase his force considerable when things get to running smoothly. The city is now having the rock put on Fifth street, which will be gravelled throughout its entire length.

Last year, it will be remembered, Mr Bissell had a like contract with the city. The average day's work was near 180 loads. But the contractor believes he can bring the daily average up to 140 or 145 cubic yards this year. The work of crushing gravel is much easier and more rapid than that of crushing quarried or boulder rocks and the resulting product a great deal more satisfactory. The gravel of the bar is scooped up in road scrapers and dragged by way of a bridge to the mouth of a crusher where it is dumped in. This gravel contains much sand as well as small rocks and such a combination makes a hard and well packed road bed.
