Road Contract Let.

The county commissioners' court, in session today, let the contract of improving a part of the McKenzie road, money for which was partly appropriated by the county and partly raised by private subscriptions, to Chas. F. Croner, the well known Eugene teamster.

Mr. Croner's bid was 75 cents per yard and the work to be done is as follows:
First—On the road from High Banks to Thurston, dirt work and gravel, all holes in middle of road to be filled, stamps to be taken out and gravel two rows wide where necessary, and all patch work on that part of the road.

Second—From Hendricks Ferry to the Barney Wood Hill, to be fixed in like manner as above.
Mr. Croner will commence the work in a short time. He is required to finish the work by the 10th of October.

FREE LIBRARY.

The Fortnightly Club's Library now Contains Almost Seven Hundred Volumes—Office Hours.

At present the library contains between 600 and 700 volumes of carefully selected books. Additions are made from time to time depending upon the funds at hand.

DEAN SANDERSON LECTURES

Tells People of Portland of Divinity Schools in Other States Near State Universities.

Yesterday's Portland Journal: In his lecture before the First Christian church yesterday, Dr. E. C. Sanderson, dean of the Eugene Divinity School, about which there has been some press comment of its relations with the University of Oregon, mentioned several universities which have divinity students who partake of the advantages offered therein. He also said: "The universities are open to all, and why should we not avail ourselves of the opportunities offered? Why should a young man be discriminated against because he is studying for the ministry?"

"The authorities of the Eugene Divinity School never entertained any idea of uniting church and state, nor do they ask for special privileges for our students who attend classes at the University. The state institution has never instituted any special course for our benefit, nor have we ever asked for such, but so long as the doors are open to all, we propose to enjoy the excellent advantages offered."

Building Contract Let.

W. S. Sanders let the contract for the remodeling of building on Willamette street at present occupied by the grocery of J. L. Page. W. H. Fenton is the contractor and work will begin as soon as material can be secured. Among the things that will be done are the following: The floor will be lowered to the level of the walk; an entire new plate glass front will be made in front; considerable dirt will be excavated and a basement made under the floor; a skylight will be installed; the entire rear end will be rebuilt. The building will be strictly up-to-date with all modern arrangements when finished.
