THE IMMIGRATION PAMPHLETS

The Commercial Club Will Appropriate \$150 Toward Printing Them.

At the meeting of the Eugene Commercial Club last night the matter of getting out the 100,000 immigration pamphlet for distribution in the East by the Harriman immigration bureau was thoroughly and enthusiastically discussed by a large number of members present, and it was voted as the sense of the meeting that the club set aside \$150 toward printing these pamphlets, the citizens at large to furnish the remaining sum necessary.

E O Potter, Robert McMurphy and F M Wilkins, the committee appointed to compile the matter for the pamphlet, were instructed to obtain prices for printing them and report at the next meeting, Friday evening.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS

Fifty-Seven Applicants for Certificates Before the Examining Board.

County School Superintendent W M Miller and assistants, Mrs Vina Lemley and Miss Nettie Kress, opened the regular quarterly examination for teachers' certificates in the circuit court room at the courthouse this forenoon at 9 o'clock.

Fifty-seven applicants appeared before the board of examiners, 47 of whom are taking the examination for county papers and 10 for state papers. The examinations will be completed Saturday, and it will be several days before the papers can be gone through and the markings made.

As usual there are a great many more ladies taking the examination than men. The ratio is probably 4 to 1.

Board of Survey.

A board of survey, ordered by the adjutant general of the state to meet at the armory Monday night, met and adjourned until next Monday evening. The board was appointed at the request of Captain O H Young, of Troop A, O N G, of Lebanon, to fix the responsibility for the loss of considerable state and United States property, for which Captain Young is accountable. The board consists of Captain R S Huston, Captain C C Kauffman and Lieutenant J A Currie, and upon meeting found that no affidavits or certificates of loss had been filed by the officer asking for the board, and adjourned for one week.
