RECORD OF

PROF. E. E. DeCOU

The New Professor of Mathematics at the University of Oregon.

Yesterday's Portland Telegram prints a picture of Professor Edgar E DeCou, the newly appointed professor of mathematics at the University of Oregon, and appends the following sketch:

Edgar E DeCou professor of mathematics of the University of Oregon, graduated from the state normal school at Madison, S D, in 1890. He taught in the normal school at Madison for two years. He graduated from the university of Wisconsin in 1894, and was two years principal of the high school at Evansville, Wis. He was a graduate student of the university of Chicago in 1896-7, taking the master's degree. Then for two years he was professor of mathematics of Bethel college, at Russellville, Ky. He was again a graduate student of the university of Chicago in 1899-1900 and a graduate student of Yale in 1900-01. He was professor of mathematics at Russellville, Ky, in 1901-02. He was a student at Chicago university during the present summer.

THE MARVELOUS LIQUID AIR

May be Brought to Our City and Its Possibilities Demonstrated.

The GUARD is informed that a demonstration of the marvels of liquid air is a possibility in the near future. Dr DeCou, the most wonderful experiments, illustrations of the method of converting atmospheric air into a liquid 312 degrees below zero and a clear and honest presentation of liquid air's wonderful possibilities by a clever lecturer and demonstrator, constitute an evening's entertainment of novelty and instruction, a pleasant voyage into the fairyland of science. A route is being planned through the West by H B Thearle, 17 River street, Chicago, to whom application for date and terms should be promptly made if some local society or club desires to secure for a benefit entertainment this novel, profitable and up-to-date attraction.

Liquid air is ordinary atmospheric air in an extraordinary condition, looking and flowing like water, a liquid, but absolutely dry and so cold that ice is comparatively a red hot stove to it. It is fiercely when put on ice, but freezes the flame of an oil stove when placed thereon. It melts steel but freezes alcohol. It will burn an electric light carbon at a temperature of about 3500 degrees above zero in the same tumbler in which cranberries are being frozen as hard as a stone. Rubber, tin and iron are made as brittle as glass while mercury is made as hard as steel and nails are driven with a quicksilver hammer. Automobiles have been propelled by liquid air and the New York hospitals have had some promising results with its curative properties in cancer cases and also as a local anesthetic in surgical operations. It can be made an explosive, or used as an agent for producing complete combustion of garbage and there are many uses for its component gases, oxygen and nitrogen.
