TAKE TIME TO LIVE.

The Oregonian finds a lesson in the demise of Prof Black while the sun of his life was still well in its morning:

Professor C W M Black, the quiet, scholarly recluses of the faculty of the University of Oregon, who died a few days ago while on the way to Colorado for the benefit of his health, was an earnest, studious young man, who appears to have taken life all too seriously to compass many years of it. A consumptive, he shied himself up with his books while his lungs were demanding fresh air and opportunity for expansion, and his strength was failing from the inroads of disease and lack of exercise. There is but one penalty for a mistake of this kind, and that is Professor Black paid before thirty years of a possible ninety had been told. The pity of his death is in the canceled opportunity, the arrested usefulness and development that it obviates.

Well said! Way should men and women make slaves of themselves to an idea—that they must lose no time, must go through life on a high pressure basis? The man who thinks the world will not move along as usual after he is dead is sadly mistaken. He will die and will not long be missed apart from his family circle.

WHO HEIRS THE FAIR MILLIONS?

The terrible death of the San Francisco millionaire, Charles Fair and wife in France Thursday, under their forty ton automobile, brings up a rather curious question as to the disposition of the millions he leaves.

Who died first? If Fair died first his wife would inherit all that portion of the vast fortune not disposed of by will, provided one exists, and it would go to her people. The courts will probably hold otherwise though, if no positive proof exists, as seems to be the case. The common law holds that in case of common accident and death the young and strong die last; that the man of about equal age and condition with the woman survives her. The application is often made in case of shipwreck where it is very reasonable to suppose that the woman would perish before the man. It is on such fine points of law that the millions left by the dead man hang.

COLUMBIA'S SALMON.

Who will say that the salmon is not a great fish and the Columbia River not its greatest breeding waters? At Harrington Point, Monday, twenty-five and one quarter tons of the fish were taken in five hauls, probably a record-breaker even for the Columbia. A single haul of the seine brought out twelve hundred fish weighing about nine tons, an average of fifteen pounds to the fish. This was great fishing.

Science is responsible. Several years ago fish hatcheries turned out the salmon fry that are now returning from the home of their nativity from out the unknown depths of the great Pacific. From what part of the great ocean? None may answer.

Insanity admissions to Bellevue Hospital, New York City, during the past three days are a puzzle to attending physicians. The average admissions are less than three a day yet thirty-two were received in the three days, the majority of whom were unusually violent. Two thirds of them were women and there were few alcoholic patients. The sudden increase of insanity cannot be accounted for

by weather conditions as it has not been unusually hot.

The convention for the five thousand dollar reward offered by Governor McBride of Washington for Convict Tracy may lose some of its interest. It is now claimed that the governor had no authority to offer more than a thousand dollars. It would be much easier to compromise claims on the smaller sum.

New York is relocating the Adirondack mountains with moose after an extermination of fifty years. The animals are secured from Canada.
