WILL SHIP EXHIBIT TONIGHT

Willamette Valley Land Co, Sending Display of Products to Nebraska.

The Willamette Valley Land Co, which is doing a very commendable thing in the way of advertising our products in the East by sending a display to Lincoln, Neb., to be exhibited at the Nebraska state fair, will ship the display tonight. It will go in a stout wooden box placarded "Willamette Valley Land Co, Eugene, Oregon," in big letters.

While the display is not a large one it will attract very much attention as the samples are some of the best that could be found in the county. They consist of stalks of wheat, oats, barley, alfalfa, grasses, etc, wheat, and oats in bulk, wool, mohair, mineral specimens and two mounted Chinese pheasants. Amos Wilkins, of Coburg, furnished samples of 23 varieties of wheat, 7 of oats and one of barley.

Willard Cooper who is now conducting a branch office of the company at Lincoln will take charge of the exhibit upon its arrival there and arrange it in a tent 20x30 feet on the state fair grounds.
