BROKE HIS LEG

AT BLUE RIVER

Wagon Rolled Down a Grade and Samuel Pellet Suffered Severe Injury.

Samuel Pellet and Robert Day were on their way Friday to their mining property in the Blue River district and were within a hundred yards of the cabin descending the grade on Gold Hill when the brake gave way and frightened the horses so that they toppled the whole rig over the grade, damaging things seriously and breaking Mr Pellet's leg about two and a half inches below the knee joint. Mr Day was thrown out but escaped serious injury. Medical aid was summoned and the injured member was set.

Mr Day came back to Eugene last night and started this morning with a rig to meet Mr Pellet, who has already started on the mail wagon from Blue River. They will arrive in Eugene tomorrow afternoon.

Carnival Board Meeting.

The Owen Coal Vein.

The old coal property, discovered some 20 years ago on the Owen place, nine miles west of Eugene, is being partially developed by Alf Walker, who has two men working on the vein. The "blossom" was only 8 inches wide at the mouth of the tunnel but increases to a vein 30 inches thick at the face. The coal is in blanket form instead of a ledge and runs on a declivity of 5 feet to 75 into the hill. Mr Walker says the property has long been considered valuable and that if the coal could be mined in marketable quantities it would be a boon for the county.

Twenty-two Years a Clerk.

A T Cockerline, who for 22 years has been employed as clerk in S H Friendly's dry goods store, has resigned his position, the resignation taking effect last Saturday night. Mr Cockerline will now devote his time in preparing for the opening of the new store of Cockerline & Wetherbee in the new McClung block, Mr Cockerline being the senior member of the firm. The Game Law.

Under the revised game law, the open season for hunting is as follows: Deer, moose and mountain sheep, July 15 to November 1; quail, grouse, ptarmigan, prairie chicken, pheasant, October 1 to March 14th; snipe, swan, duck, September 1 to March 15; fawn, English partridge and wild turkey are protected until February 1, 1904, elk and beaver until 1910.
