WESTERN OREGON MUST HURRY UP

Immigration Literature From Everywhere Else Already in Chicago.

"Western Oregon should hurry up with the descriptive pamphlets of their counties," said Traveling Passenger Agent J P Jones, of the S P Co, yesterday. Mr Jones is making one of his regular official trips in connection with which he is urging more haste in the preparation of literature to be forwarded to the immigration bureau in Chicago.

"Washington, Eastern Oregon and California now have their literature in Chicago," said Mr Jones, "and thousands of inquiries are being received at the bureau from prospective immigrants to the West, who desire information additional to that which the pamphlets furnish. It should be borne in mind that the special rates to the West go into effect on Sept 1st, and now is the time that people back there are beginning to make up their minds on the proposition of coming out West. So you see if Western Oregon would have herself advertised at the proper moment she should not hesitate to forward her descriptive literature to Chicago at once, if possible. Several towns throughout Southern Oregon are now printing their pamphlets and in a few days a large consignment will be sent East. Hurry these people up," concluded Mr Jones, plucking up his grip, and with an apologetic smile, he added, "for you see I am somewhat interested in Western Oregon myself."

The Fountaine Shows.

The show given in the tent by H J Fountaine and troupe at the corner of Sixth and Willamette streets is being well patronized and will be so during the remainder of the week if the performances remain up to the present standard.
