It will not show "safe" until the switch is actually locked in place the raising and lowering of the lock lever rather than the throwing of the switch actuating the signal. The ordinary signal is actuated by throwing the switch and the switch may be tampered with, and the signal will show largely "safe."

Obituary.

George W Humphrey was born in Philadelphia, Penn, Jan 1st, 1837, and died at his home at Fall Creek, Oregon, August 14, 1902. When about 13 years of age he moved with his mother to Iowa, where he lived about three years. He then spent several years on the plains and in California and came to Oregon in 1854. He enlisted in the army in 1865, serving in Company A, 1st Oregon Cavalry. He was discharged with the regiment at Fort Vancouver in 1866. He then returned to Eugene vicinity where he was married in 1870 to Miss Mary C Noble, daughter of Mr and Mrs Orin Noble, pioneers of 1853. In 1871 they moved to Fall Creek, where they have since resided.

Mr Humphrey was the father of twelve children, ten of whom are now living, two sons having died several years ago.

He was converted July 28, 1861, at a camp meeting in Butte county, California. He united with the M E church and has lived a consistent member up to his death. He leaves a host of friends to mourn his loss.

Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Saturday morning at the residence of Mrs M E Noble, Fall Creek. Burial in the cemetery.
