COMBINED HARVESTER

Umatilla Man Builds a Cheap and Servicable One—Two Men Do the Work.

W. T. Rigby has the distinction of running the smallest combined harvester on his place on the Umatilla reservation of any man in the state of Oregon, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

It is a 12-foot header and 28-inch cylinder thresher. This machine is drawn by 12 horses and is cutting from 20 to 25 acres a day. It is not only doing a good job of threshing, but all the work is being done by two men, a sack sewer and a driver.

The machine was built on Mr. Rigby's ranch. They worked on the place for several months and at last concluded they would build the machine after their own ideas, which would answer the demands of the small farmer and save his grain at less than one-half the cost of operating the combined harvester of today.

All the castings were made at the Pendleton foundry and the woodwork and blacksmithing were done right on the farm. The machine was fashioned after the ideas of inventors and put together on the ranch.

When the grain was ripe enough to begin operations this baby harvester was pulled into the field and started. After a test of two or three minutes without changes to the gears and workings of the machine, it moved off a smoothly as any factory manufactured machine. Now from 20 to 25 acres a day is being harvested with it, and the machine is working to perfection.

Mr. Rigby says this will place the grain in the sack with an ordinary combine, makes the expense very small.
