ATTEMPT TO WRECK TRAIN

Fiendish Work of Miscreants Near Shedd's This Morning.

Ties Placed on the Track Discovered Just in Time to Avert a Terrible Catastrophe.

Railway officials here were apprised early this morning of a dastardly attempt to cause disaster to the second section of the northbound passenger train by placing ties on the track near Shedd's, the station some 25 miles below Eugene.

Train No 16 was in two sections which ran about 15 minutes apart. The first section passed through Eugene at 3:13 o'clock this morning and the second went through at 3:31. The first section passed through Shedd's in perfect safety, and immediately the ties were piled on the track. They were discovered by the engineer of the second section just in time to save the rushing train from being derailed. Many lives were probably saved by this prompt action.

Officers along the line were immediately notified, but as yet no clue to the miscreants has been unearthed.

The motive for the crime cannot be accounted for as the express and mail were on the first section.

BICYCLE THIEVES AT THEIR WORK

A Salem Man's Wheel Stolen From the Hoffman House—Others Stolen.

C W Evans, of Salem, who has been at the springs for an outing on his wheel, came down Saturday and put his machine inside the Hoffman House. It was missed Sunday and the officers have been looking for the thief. The Well Known Upper McKenzie Camping Place Changes Hands.

Nearly twenty years ago A S Powers and family located a homestead on the bank of the McKenzie River at the new McKenzie Bridge postoffice. He hewed a place out of the timber, planted an orchard and built substantial improvements. A ditch brings water through the place from farther up the river and the water makes the light soil produce good crops of excellent vegetables and hay.

The other day Mr Powers sold his place to John O'Leary, a substantial sheepman of Eastern Oregon, who has pastured several thousand sheep on the river in the McKenzie road vicinity for two seasons past, and camped with his family during the summer months at one or other of the hot springs or McKenzie Bridge. Then they would return to their Eastern Oregon home in the fall. The consideration was \$4,000, a very reasonable price considering the improvements. We are informed that Mr Powers will move to Eugene for the winter.
